LEAGUE SESSIONS ENDED

City of Eugene Chosen for Next Convention

Independence Men of Public Spirit Show Great Enterprise as Entertainers

The second day of the Willamette Valley Development Convention was called to order at 9 o'clock. A session of the delegates was held prior to consider some plan of promoting harbor improvements, and how to secure a railroad from Western Oregon to a deep sea harbor.

Judge W. H. Hollis was the first speaker on the program, and delivered an address on "Ownership of Public Utilities."

The following committee was, on motion duly made and seconded, named by the president to work up a report on how to secure a connection with another deep sea harbor, the committee to report at the next convention:

Polk county, Gus A. Hurley; Marion, L. M. Gilbert; Lane, I. H. Bingham; Linn, W. P. Elmore; Benton, Pun Avery; Lincoln, B. F. Jones; Clackamas, Frank Jagger, Washington, W. H. Hollis; Yamhill, Chas. Grissen.

On both days of the convention there was a large attendance of ladies. The stage and opera house were decorated by the ladies, and masses of roses were displayed on the platform.

"Transportation and Manufactures in Oregon" was next presented by Hon. I. H. Bingham, of Eugene, in an able and eloquent address. He said the initiative and referendum was a dangerous power—liable to abuse. Dangerous also to corporations, he said.

Mrs. Weathered discussed "The Needs of Oregon." More people and more publicity were the greatest needs of Oregon. She ridiculed the Oregon exhibit at St. Louis, and the "Shooting up the Town" statue at the Lewis and Clark fair.

Hon. Walter Toole, of Woodburn, next addressed the convention on "The Opening of the Willamette Locks at Oregon City by Government Ownership." The people still owned the river. The public lands were mostly gone, but, thank God, the people still owned the river. No corporation could get a cinch on that. The Panama canal would add seven cents a bushel to the value of Western wheat. Opening the locks would save 50 cents a ton to the shippers, and would save the farmers nearly two cents a bushel on grain by making the locks free. He did not believe the country was ready for public ownership. If the acts of the legislature did not suit the people they could initiate measures to suit themselves. If the people did not use the power it was their own fault.

Governor Gear thought the corporations could and did control the Willamette river. The representatives in

L. M. Gilbert made a report on the deep sea harbor section of the convention, in favor of an unanimous effort for again opening Yaquina bay.

Hon. Walter Griffin, of Eugene, read an address to the people from the transportation committees of the State and the Willamette Valley Development Leagues. The report was adopted.

On motion the convention voted between Eugene and Forest Grove as next place of meeting. Eugene was chosen. Resolutions thanking the people of Independence for hospitality and entertainment, and the committee for 500 pounds prime steer roasted, and Hon. B. F. Jones for thirty bushels of clams, and the clam bake committee for their splendid work, were adopted, and the convention adjourned.

Independence is very fortunate in having a bright and aggressive set of business men who make all they take hold of a success. Men like Mayor Messner, W. W. Percival, Postmaster Merwin, Huston & Simons, Bice & Calvert, Jos. Hirschberg, Walter Lyon, Gus A. Hurley, and many others the reporter met cannot be easily duplicated in larger places when it comes to showing public spirit. Independence is not hampered by being a county seat, state capital, or any other artificial drawbacks. Of course a great deal of the credit of the clam bake belongs to B. F. Jones, but just the same the Independence men were able to enlist a man like Jones, and he is a host, and they broke the record by having the first clam bake in the interior of the state. The autocar line established by Mr. Baldwin, of this city, was a great help to in the success in the

cess of the convention. It made three trips a day during the convention. The same day the government engineers arrived with their boat and crews to keep the channel of the upper river open all summer. All these things were auspicious for the development of our sister city up the river. The bond of friendship between Salem and Independence has been pretty strongly cemented on the occasion of the Development Convention, and the tie is equally strong between that place and the other valley towns. The new M. E. minister, Rev. Elayer, is an Arkansas man and a host for public enterprise in himself. In all ways Independence is coming to the front of valley cities.
