## DRESS PARADE ONLY

Chinese Raise Military Companies and Go Through Regimental Drill

Other News Items From the Big Money Centers on Other Side

New York, June 17.—There is no little excitement in Chinatown over the visit of the head of the Chinese Reform association, who has just arrived in New York after a tour of the chief cities of the country. The principal purpose of his visit is to review the Chinese regiment which has been formed here. The spectacle of a Chinese regiment on parade, fully equipped and officered and displaying both the dragon flag and the Stars and Stripes of the United States, promises to be decidedly unique and interesting. It is reported that these martial Mongols have been carefully drilled and that the Chinese consul, who recently reviewed the regiment at its Mott street headquarters, expressed his approval of the show in unmeasured terms. There is considerable speculation, humorous and otherwise, as to the meaning of the military fervor of the Chinamen here and elsewhere. One story has it that the leader of the Chinese Reform association is acting under instructions from the dowager empress in perfecting these military organizations throughout the country, and the horrid thought preys upon the mind of one commentator that the dowager's purpose is to form an army of laundrymen, fan tan dealers, chop suey housekeepers and other industrious denizens of the Flowery Kingdom sojourning with us, and then turn them loose in an attempt to annex the country to China. According to a Chinatown authority, 6000 Chinamen are now drilling in various parts of the country, and many more will be added until a formidable army is organized.

Aroused by the energy of the Newport News Dry Dock & Shipbuilding company, which is building the battleship Louisiana at Newport News, workmen at the local navy yard will work from now on night and day to complete the battleship Connecticut for the government before the southern shipbuilders can finish the Louisiana. The commissioning of the Connecticut is booked for September. The yard officials believe that the chances for the Connecticut being ready to go into commission before the Louisiana are excellent.

The Charity Organization Society's Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis has organized a sub-committee of 21 colored physicians and clergymen to fight tuberculosis among the colored people of this city, and the health board has put its dispensary under the supervision of the medical members of the sub-committee for three evenings a week. In addition to affording the colored physicians every facility for studying the disease among their race a course of illustrated lectures dealing with tuberculosis will be given in the colored churches. The society believes that work along this line is needed before much can be done to lessen the number of tuberculosis cases in New York. There are between 60,000 and 65,000 colored persons in this city, and their death rate from tuberculosis is 5.33 per 1,000, as against 2.37 per 1,000 among the whites, showing plainly that the stronghold of tuberculosis is in the colored population.

treasure box and lends it to the bride. Up to the present 20 brides have worn that lace and every one of the score is firmly convinced that she is the only person, except the widow, who has used it.

To those interested in the sociological questions of prison reform, the fact that the parole system has met with pronounced success in this city will be welcomed. The idea had its inception here and was afterward carried out throughout the state. Only 15 per cent of the men paroled in the four years the law has been in effect have proved delinquent under the opportunity given them to lead honest lives outside. The disgrace of conviction in many first cases brings the desire to live honest lives, and just as far as the board of parole believes that desire to be genuine and strong, and as fast as employment outside can be found for the prisoners, they are released on parole. The work of the present board is commended by its general results and by the fact that, while the board has paroled many young offenders, it refused clemency to "Al" Adams, the pulley king, who had every influence except a good record to plead for him. Many of the prisoners get their first experience of regular labor in prison, and its moralizing and steady influence is one of the most powerful agencies for reform.

Any collection that Mrs. John R. Drexel undertakes is bound to be worth looking at, and the assortment of pendants which she has recently gathered proves to be no exception.
