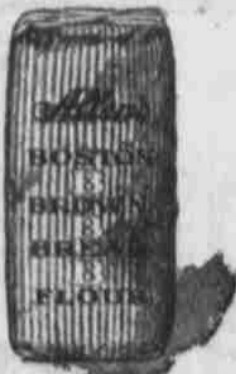

EPLEY EASILY ELECTED

Issues Brought in That Had No Business There or Anywhere

The school election is over, and the people of school district No. 24, of Marion county have placed Dr. H. C. Epley in the position of director for the next five years. No great issue was involved, unless it was opposition to secret sessions of the school board, and a square deal for everybody, and no great interest was taken until personalities were injected into the fight by some unwise friends of Mr. Fletcher, and Mr. Epley's friends had only a few hours in which to counteract the effect, but the job was well done. Mr. Fletcher's candidacy had been worked up for many weeks, whereas the candidacy of Dr. Epley was only 48 hours' old when the polls opened, and his friends were unorganized.

At noon a printed circular was put out by ill-advised friends of Mr. Fletcher, which started off by stating that the reason the people wanted Mr. Fletcher for director was because "he was not E. Hofer's candidate," and the other nine reasons were chiefly platitudes that meant little. Mr. Hofer was taking so little interest in the matter that he was not even in the county, but when a friend telephoned him he at once returned, and arrived in his ward after 3 o'clock. Under the circumstances he felt justified in seeing a few of his friends, and the results speak for themselves, for No. 7 gave Dr. Epley the largest majority in the whole district, going 57 to 18 in his favor. A young business man in East Salem had not expected to do anything, but the circular put him to work, and the precinct gave a neat majority for Epley. And so it went all over town. Several dozen professional and business men had not expected to vote until this ill-timed circular came to their notice. Many ladies, who had a keen sense of fairness also put in some good looks and votes galore, and on the whole it is estimated that Mr. Fletcher would have been elected by over 50 majority had not his little joker been flung to the breeze. His gun was overloaded, and kicked.

The vote by precincts is given below, which shows that Mr. Epley was elected by 19 majority:
