PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES

Sheriff Culver Sends Out Notices to Come Forward and Settle

Sheriff Culver and his deputies are busy sending out notices to persons delinquent on their personal property tax. For the first time in the history of the state there was no exemption on household goods, and it is upon these that the sheriff is trying to collect in what is due the county. To most of the people affected this comes as a surprise, as they are chiefly poor people, who have in the past paid no taxes, and the tax collector is experiencing some trouble in cleaning up the work. However, many who have been informed are paying up now, and the sending out of these notices will no doubt result in a further influx of cash. The section of the law under which this is done follows:

Section 3107. On or immediately after the first Monday of May in each year in May the sheriff shall proceed to collect all taxes levied in his county upon personal property of which one-half was not paid as hereinbefore provided on or before the first Monday of April, together with the penalty and interest. He shall levy upon sufficient goods and chattels belonging to the person or corporation charged with such taxes, if the same can be found in the county, by taking them into his possession, to pay such delinquent taxes, together with interest, accruing interest, penalties and other lawful charges, and shall immediately advertise such goods and chattels for sale by posting notices of the time and place of sale in three places in his county, not less than ten days prior to such sale and if such taxes, interest and penalties shall not be paid before the time appointed for such sale, the sheriff shall proceed to sell such property at public vendue, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to pay such taxes, interest and penalties, and shall deliver to the purchasers thereof at such sale the property so sold to them respectively, and such sale shall be absolute.
