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OBSERVE MAZZINE CENTENARY

All Italy Does Honor to the Memory of One of Her Greatest Patriots

Rome, June 22.—Public festivals and demonstrations were held today throughout the kingdom in observance of the centenary of the birth of Joseph Mazzini, the Italian patriot.

Mazzini ranks with Garibaldi and Cavour in the great trio of Italian liberators. He was born of middle-class parentage at Genoa, June 22, 1805. Sentiments of social equality were early engendered in him by parental example. In 1830 his affiliation to the secret society of the Carbonari introduced his practical political career.
