

CHICAGO STRIKE MATTERS

Chicago, June 24,-President Shei, of the teamsters, said today he would vote against accepting the peace proposition of the employers, upon which various local union teamsters would make a referendum next week. Shea showed talk of calling a general strike and tying up the business of this city. Heretofore he has opposed this, arguing that the strength of the teamsters lay in keeping a large portion of the men at work, in order to furnish strike benefits. Shea said if it was submitted by the peace committee, it was not improbable they would be asked to vote on a general strike proposition.

The employers issued a statement announcing that, unless the tetmsters accepted the proposed terms before Monday, negotiations would be off for all time, and the strikers would never be given their old positions,
