Sheepmen Chopped to Pieces and Bodies Thrown in an Abandoned Well

Albuquerque, N. M., June 24.—Carmel Bacon and Nicholas Sanchez, wealthy sheep owners, were hacked to death with axes, while bringing in the wool clip at Laposta, New Mexico, their bodies being thrown into an abandoned well, and their wagons burned. A half-breed, Amelle McClure, who was with the party, has been arrested, but denies his guilt. He says three Indians descended on the camp and committed the crime.

CHICAGO STRIKE MATTERS

Chicago, June 24.—President Shea, of the teamsters, said today he would vote against accepting the peace proposition of the employers, upon which various local union teamsters would make a referendum next week. Shea showed talk of calling a general strike and tying up the business of this city. Heretofore he has opposed this, arguing that the strength of the teamsters lay in keeping a large portion of the men at work, in order to furnish strike benefits. Shea said if it was submitted by the peace committee, it was not improbable they would be asked to vote on a general strike proposition. The employers issued a statement announcing that, unless the teamsters accepted the proposed terms before Monday, negotiations would be off for all time, and the strikers would never be given their old positions.

Eugene, Or., June 24.—John Branton who tried to murder his friend, in order to collect \$3000 life insurance, was found guilty, and this morning was sentenced to ten years in the pen, the maximum penalty.
