name is conspicuously placed so that  
every one can see it, but the exhibit is  
a disgrace to the county. The gentle-  
man in charge is County Judge Brown,  
of Toledo, and he seems to be ashamed  
of himself. There he is with a stuffed  
cougar skin, pair of elk horns, wild cat  
and bear skin, and a few oysters, which  
was all that could be seen.

No minerals, fruits, vegetables, but-  
ter, wool, mohair, lumber or fish were  
in evidence. This in the midst of the  
fine display of other counties made the  
Judge look small indeed, and if he had  
had anything large enough I think he  
would have hidden behind it. What  
has become of the committee that was  
to collect and send in specimens of the  
products of the county? What has be-  
come of the county's appropriation? Who  
is to blame?—Corvallis Gazette.
