While the crew was out on the track at work a few days ago, the box car and section house took fire. Citizens extinguished the flames and saved the house, but the car was burned. This habitation had been built up high and the Chinaman had a quantity of fire wood under the car and when the crew, apprised of the fire, came in the wood was burning fiercely. Jim seized a long bar of iron and began frantically to tear away the burning fire wood while the people stood about and watched his frenzied efforts with interest. Soon the Chinaman desisted and pulled out of the burning mass of wood a badly battered oyster can, and in this it was found was hoarded the savings of the Celestial, consisting of \$680. The money was intact except the topmost of the \$20 gold pieces, it being badly defaced by the heat. The Chinaman had used the pile of wood under his box car cabin as his safe deposit vault. 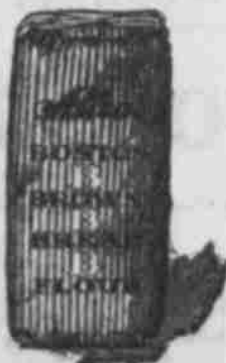
