**Portland School Directors Put Embargo on Marriage**

Portland's board of education is up against it. School teachers, without consideration for the effect of their action upon education, are actually giving their consent to various young gentlemen to become their wives, and the situation has become so acute that the school directors have reached the resolution stage.

If published accounts can be accepted for it, a most deplorable condition of affairs exists. Many of the teachers have become engaged without having informed the directors of their contemplated action, and the list of those just married, or about to be, shows that the number is not small. Whereas the directors labored in the belief that the teachers would remain single through life, so that the efficiency of the schools would not be impaired, they are now face to face with a marriage epidemic of the most virulent sort.

It is also declared, with much evident earnestness, that the teachers have formed a matrimonial combine, or trust, and that under the operation of this trust the pedagogues purpose marrying without even the formality of an apology to the directors. It is reported that the motto of the teachers' trust is "Get married if you can," and it is further stated that the trust has met with even more success than the most sanguine anticipated.

Anyway, Cupid's recruits have decimated the ranks of the pedagogues, and the far-seeing directors are bending every energy to head off the matrimonial contagion. Here is the resolution:

"Resolved, That any unmarried per-

son employed as a teacher to serve during the ensuing school year who shall marry subsequent to her election shall be deemed to have violated the contract of employment, and such person shall be deemed to have resigned her position and shall at once cease to be an employe of the district, unless subsequent to such marriage the school board shall consent to continue such teacher in the employ of the district."

An Astoria school teacher, discussing the matter this afternoon, said she thought it would be a good idea for all teachers to get into the trust. She is decidedly of the opinion that school teaching is all right so long as the fair-haired youth does not put in an appearance, but that the very general feminine desire to marry is characteristic of teachers as well as those girls whose lot is not quite so hard, and who do not have to teach.

"And it would just tickle me to death if all the teachers in the Portland schools were to marry without even letting the directors know anything about it," said the teacher, who was indignant over the resolution of the Portland board. "I guess we have a right to marry if we can find fellows who will have us."—Astoria News.
