## CLEANED OUT THE JAIL

### Mob Got Busy With a Few Bad Men, Regardless of Color

Athens, Ga., June 29.—At the town of Watkinsville, seven miles from here, a mob broke into the jail early this morning and lynched a white man and seven negroes, for the recent shocking double murder of an aged white couple, also one other negro for an attempted criminal assault.

Athens, Ga., June 29.—The mob of 100 armed and masked men broke into the jail, meeting no resistance. The victims were strung up in the public square and their bodies riddled with bullets. The state authorities were notified, but it is not thought that they will take any steps to punish the lynchers.

The mob formed quietly just after midnight, marched in order to the jail, where the keys were demanded of the jailer, who saw that resistance was useless, as the mob was heavily armed. The mob then opened the cells, lined the victims up, tying them with ropes, and marched them to a corner lot, within two hundred yards of the jail, and bound them to the fence with their hands behind them. At the command of the leader the mob stepped back, took deliberate aim and fired a volley from rifles, pistols and shotguns. Every man fell, and the mob quietly dispersed. Joe Patterson was found lying on the ground only slightly injured.

### Purchase Postoffice Site.

Washington D. C., June 28.—Arrangements are being made to pay the Pennsylvania Railroad Company \$1,700,000 for the site of the new postoffice in New York, Eighth avenue, Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets. Officials of the department of justice are at work preparing a deed to transfer the property.

According to the law authorizing the purchase of the site, the railroad will occupy the ground beneath the surface for a station, while the postoffice will be on the surface. Officials of the government have endeavored to get a title in fee simple to the site, but the railroad company would not agree to this. It was willing to give title only to the surface and ground as far beneath as the foundation extended. No appropriation has been made for building, but congress at its next session will be asked for \$4,000 for that purpose.

#### Roasts Iowa.

A short time ago a man by the name of Russel Gifford went insane in Crawford county, Iowa. The officials of that county alleged that his residence was in Corvallis, Oregon, and accordingly the sheriff of that county brought him to Corvallis, from which place he was committed to the asylum. The state officials here did not understand the circumstances of the case until it was too late to protest. This morning the governor received a letter from the board of control of state institutions of Iowa, asking that the state of Oregon pay to Crawford county, Iowa, \$171.11, the cost of transporting Gifford from Iowa to Oregon. In his reply Governor Chamberlain, not only stated that this state would refuse to pay the bill, but also took occasion to roast the officials of Crawford county in such a way that they will remember for some time to come. He said that Oregon had always been charitable enough to take care of the insane found within her borders, without looking into their history to find out whether they had been here long enough to acquire residence. He stated that, if Oregon, and the other Western states, should follow the example set by Iowa, that they would be able to unload fully one-half of their insane patients upon the eastern states. In conclusion he asserted that if any officer of the state of Iowa was caught bringing a patient into the state, that the officer would either be punished or compelled to return with his charge.

Washington, June 29.—At the request of Secretary Hitchcock, Attorney General Moody has ordered a special grand jury at Lewiston, Idaho, to consider land fraud cases, which otherwise would expire July 15th, under the statute of limitations. Inspectors have been six months collecting evidence.

### American Yachts at Kiel.

Kiel, June 29.—Never before has there been gathered so many American yachts in German waters as are assembled here for the annual regatta which began today. Nearly all of the American yachts that took part in the recent race across the Atlantic for the emperor's cup are here, and in addition there are the North Star, belonging to Cornelius Vanderbilt, and a number of others. Mrs. Robert Golet's yacht Nahma is here with Charlemagne Tower, the American ambassador, and Mrs. Tower, as guests.

Emperor William since his arrival here has paid marked attention to Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt and also to other notable Americans. At the close of the regatta the emperor is to give a banquet aboard the imperial yacht, to which a number of Americans have been invited.

Washington, June 29.—Ambassador Meyer has informed the state department that the Russian government is about to promulgate an order for the mobilization of troops in the districts of St. Petersburg, Warsaw, Moscow and Kiev for the ostensible purpose of strengthening the forces in Manchuria.
