CLIMBS MOUNT HOOD

Salem Boy Gets up in the
World Entirely by His
Own Effort

Kingsley, Ore., June 19th.

Brother David:—I have just finished giving Clarence a little of my hot air, and have some left, so I will give the remainder to you. I am feeling fine and dandy at the present time, but am just getting over the effects of climbing Mt. Hood Friday. In doing so got my legs stove up some, and my face burnt in a few places, where I failed to get the paint on. We had to wear paint and dark eye glasses to protect up from the sun.

Well, well, I see that I will have to tell you about the trip up Hood first of all. The guide, Mr. Yocum, called myself and Mr. Shoales, of Portland, at three o'clock in the morning. By four o'clock we were going up hill toward Hood. After traveling about 3½ miles we came to small drifts of snow and the drifts continued to increase until the ground was covered. The snow was hard and icy and we did not sink in over our shoe soles going up. By nine o'clock we had reached Crater rock where we stayed for an hour and ate our lunch and painted our faces. There were warm places where we could melt snow and boil water had we wanted to. From Crater rock to the summit it did not look to be over three hundred feet away, but the guide said it was a mile or more. It took us two hours to reach it from Crater. Some places it was very steep and the guide cut steps in the snow with his ax. Some places there were great crevasses in the snow. These we had to go around. We stepped over one small one. Thus we continued to climb until we reached the very top. When we reached there we were surprised to find that there had been three persons there ahead of us. They were up Wednesday and registered in the book which was in a tin box on top. They said it was the earliest they had any knowledge of anybody ever being to the summit. We also registered and had our pictures taken while standing on the apex. The sights were very grand, but it was most too cloudy to see far although we did see the Columbia river. The clouds surely looked fine from above. After we had stayed there for an hour we started down. This was more dangerous and we had to place our pike poles ahead of each foot as we stepped so we would not slip. This we did until we were passed the dangerous places. Then we sat down on the snow with a pike pole under our arms to serve as a brake. Then all we had to do was wiggle our feet a little and we started to go, and I should say we did go. The first stretch was about a quarter of a mile long. I was a little afraid, because it looked so steep, but after the first time it was all kinds of fun. I suppose we slid a mile or better in this way and it did not take over two minutes, or three at most. When we were half down we were encircled in a great cloud or fog, and it wasn't long until we got lost and came near running into a canyon. We were lost for a half hour or better, and what do you think, I had left my compass in my coat at the house. That was the only time I had any use for it at all. Well, we found ourselves after while and managed to get home at four o'clock. I was so tired that night that I could not sleep.

The next morning I rolled out at half past four, saddled my horse and started for the east side of the mountains. On the way I met a herd of horses and four flocks of sheep which contained eight thousand head in all. I stopped at the first small village I came to this side of the mountains. The name of it was Wamie. There was a show in the burg that night and the boys with their bear legs or cowboy pants and saddles came from a radius of fifteen miles. Some of them came in carriages with their girls. Quite a number stayed at the same hotel I did and remained over to a baseball game which was to be played between the Wamies and Victors. I left Wamie after dinner and came to this place, which is about 15 miles from there. I intend to go further north today, and will probably strike a job. It cost me \$5 to see Mt. Hood, and I am certainly getting my money's worth.

FAILED BOTH TIMES

Seattle Couple Marry Twice
and Are Twice Di-
vorced

Twice the wedding bells have merrily rung for the nuptials of Ida C. Forest and James N. Forest, and both times they have married each other!

But that is not all. Twice, also, the divorce mill has ground out decrees of divorce for the pair, and the divorce mill had the last inning, so at present Ida Forest and James Forest are no longer husband and wife, having for the second time been "put asunder" by process of law on Saturday by Judge A. W. Frater.

Judge Frater's finding of fact in the case were filed Monday morning. In those it is set down that Ida married James in Milwaukee in 1895; that they were divorced in 1898 in Manitowac; that they were re-married in June, 1900, in the state of Washington, and that Mrs. Ida Forest was now again entitled to a divorce on the ground of cruelty, James Forest having beaten her, threatened her life and put her in fear of death by his violence in the past four years.

Two little girls, aged 7 and 9, are the offsprings of this much married and much divorced couple. Their custody was awarded to the mother.

Takes Steps Against Scalpers.

Through its legal department, the O. R. & N. will this week take active steps looking to the prosecution of the ticket scalpers who have invaded this territory since the opening of the fair, and it is probable the brokers who have been in business will be bothered, for the company's lawyers say that they will make a test case, meaning the evidence now in their possession will be carefully weighed, and the scalper or criminal facts are held will be arrested and prosecuted under the state law.

A question has arisen as to whether the one broker in Portland, C. H. Thompson, can be prosecuted for the sale of tickets, for under the provisions of the law he is an authorized agent, holding a certificate of authority from the Columbia & Nehalem Valley Railroad, operating between Columbia City and Beaver. The certificate is signed by D. M. Miller, as manager of the road. It is argued, if this is permissible, other brokers can secure the agency for a small road and deal in trans-continental transportation without fear of molestation.—Telegram.
