COUNCIL HOLDS SESSION

Special Meeting Held to Consider Matter of Bonding the City

The city council met in special session last night for the purpose of considering an ordinance for the purpose of calling a special election to submit to the electors of the city the proposition of bonding the city in the sum of \$35,000 for the purpose of constructing six concrete bridges in the city.

The ordinance was put through to its first and second reading and referred to the committee on ordinances. An effort was made to put it on its third reading and final passage, but this was blocked by Alderman Bayne, who stated that he could not vote intelligently on the matter at this time.

City Recorder Moore informed the council that two bids had been received for the contract of improving South Commercial street, as advertised for by the city, and as the specified time for receiving bids had expired, upon motion of Alderman Goodale the bids were opened, and were as follows: Marshall Bros., cement contractors, of Portland, \$11,500; Warren Construction Company, of Portland, \$10,405. The bids were referred to the committee on streets.

Prof. Munsterberg Misquoted.

Prof. Munsterberg, author of "The Americans," by a speech he delivered before the Cosmopolitan club at Detroit a few weeks ago, brought the Declaration of Independence and its relation to American ideals today to rather sudden prominence. Prof. Munsterberg was quoted and misquoted in many ways, and was said to have declared that the aforementioned national document was a mass of glittering generalities, and to have indicated that the President of the United States held the same opinion. As a matter of fact in his speech, Prof. Munsterberg made no such declaration, nor did he quote President Roosevelt.

Alaska and Klondike.

A timely book at this season, when travel to Alaska is beginning again, is "Alaska and the Klondike," by J. S. McLain (McClure-Phillips). This is a book of travel, and yet in a certain measure a guide book. The author, who is the editor of the Minneapolis Journal, accompanied the subcommittee of the senate committee on territories in 1903, when it made its trip through Alaska. He had, therefore, exceptional opportunities for seeing all sides of life in the Canadian and American gold regions, on the Yukon and along the coast, and for gathering full and accurate information about the country and the people. His book takes the form of a running nar-

rative of the trip with descriptions of his experiences and the things he saw, into which he has injected all the information in an interesting manner. The book is very fully illustrated with photographs taken by the author.

DEATH OF JOHN HAY

Great Statesman Passes Away Unexpectedly This Morning

Newbury, July 1.—Secretary of State John Hay died at 12:25 a. m. this morning. The signs immediately preceding his death were those of pulmonary embolism. Hay's condition during all of Friday had been entirely satisfactory.

The bulletin of Secretary Hay's death was signed by Charles L. Scudder, M. D., and Fred T. Murphy, M. D. Mrs. Hay and Doctors Scudder and Murphy were at the secretary's bedside when the end came. The secretary bade good night to his wife and attending physicians at 10 o'clock last night, at the close of one of the best days he has had since his illness. The secretary suffered none of the old pains of the chest which characterized his earlier illness. He had been perfectly comfortable all day, and happy in anticipation of leaving his bed for the greater freedom and comfort of a couch. At 11 o'clock he was sleeping quietly. A few minutes after 12 o'clock he called the nurse, who summoned Dr. Scudder. Both Scudder and Murphy hastened to the bedside. The secretary was breathing with difficulty, and expired almost immediately afterward at 12:25.
