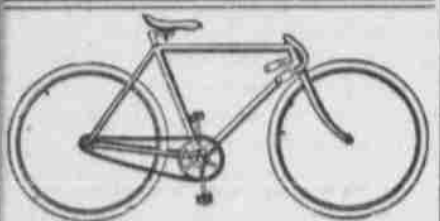

them.

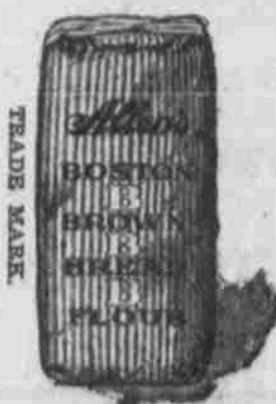
