Surgical Association Meets.

San Francisco, July 5.—The annual meeting of the American Surgical association opened here today for a three days' session.

This association is one of the component societies of the Congress of American Physicians and Surgeons. The congress meets every three years in Washington and the component societies meet annually in various cities.

The American Surgical association has a limited membership of 125, including Dr. Nicholas Senn, Dr. John B. Murphy, inventor of "Murphy's button," Dr. Roswell Park, who assisted in the operation performed on President McKinley, and several others of national reputation.

The opening of the convention was marked by the usual addresses of welcome, after which president G. B. Johnson of Richmond, Va., delivered the annual address. The reading of papers on surgical topics followed, the general theme being "Surgery of the Spine."

Tomorrow more papers on the same subject will be read.

On Friday an executive session will be held, when the reports of the auditing and nominating committees will be heard. The election of officers for the ensuing year and of new fellows will follow.
