LAUTH MUST HANG

Governor Chamberlain Re-
fuses to Commute His
Sentence to Life
Imprisonment

George Lauth's last and only hope for lift has vanished and on the 13th day of this month he will be compelled to meet his death upon the scaffold. At an early hour this morning he was informed by the superintendent that the governor had refused to intercede in his behalf. He received the news with the same quietness that has characterized his confinement in the prison.

Before starting from Portland yesterday afternoon for Buffalo, the governor wired his private secretary, Mr. Gatens, to inform Mr. Dimmick, Lauth's attorney, and Superintendent James, that after due deliberation and thought, he must refuse to commute Lauth's sentence.

The prison management, acting under orders from the governor, has adopted new rules in regard to condemned men and in future they will not be permitted to have interviews with reporters. This action was decided upon at the time of the Guglielmo execution in order to do away with all sensationalism in future. This was the purpose of the present law, which specifies that all executions shall take place at the penitentiary and the governor purposes to see that the purpose is carried out. Only a very few invitations will be issued this time and but a few more persons than the law requires to be present will be permitted to witness the hanging. Those persons who have a craving for this sort of thing and besiege the superintendent for invitations will not be admitted.

Mitchell's Case May Never Go Higher than Court of Appeals.

Senator Mitchell will appeal his case to the United States circuit court of appeals, and if there is ground to warrant it will carry it to the United States supreme court. Council for the convicted senator are by no means certain that the issue obtains upon which an appeal can be taken to the United States supreme court, and will cast about for grounds upon which to carry it up on the plea that there has been a violation of the constitutional rights of the defendant.

The right of direct appeal from the circuit court of appeals to the United States supreme court in a criminal case, such as that of Mitchell's, does not obtain in the course of ordinary procedure. There must be some good reason to carry it up at all, but the right to appeal does not follow as regards the supreme court, as it does from the district or circuit court to the circuit court of appeals.

In an appeal to the supreme court in a criminal case the appeal is addressed to the discretion of the supreme court on a question wherein the constitutional rights of a defendant have been usurped or it is made to appear that some grave injustice has been done him. Then the action takes on the character of a writ of certiorari, wherein, upon a showing that the rights of the defendant have been unwarrantably abused, a writ issues to take the record before the higher tribunal, when an inquiry is made into the facts. But this is wholly discretionary with the appellate court, and it is rare that such action is taken. This mode of procedure corresponds to a writ of review in a state circuit court, where, for instance, a writ of review might issue out of the circuit court of Multnomah county, commanding that the records of the municipal or county court be brought before a circuit judge for examination.

For supplies for the Oregon State Penitentiary during the period ending December 31, 1905.

Sealed bids for drugs, dry goods, groceries, shoes, leather and findings, plumbing supplies, hardware, flour, fish, meat, etc., will be received at the office of the superintendent of the State Penitentiary until July 10, 1905, at 2:30 o'clock p. m., at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200 in cash or certified check, payable to the superintendent, must accompany each bid for meat or flour, and all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

Samples to accompany all bids, where practicable. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and to accept or reject any portion of a bid. On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal. All goods and supplies must be delivered to the penitentiary within 20 days after the contract is awarded.

Schedules of the various lines of the goods will be furnished upon application to the superintendent.
Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following the completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

Bidders will take notice that there is no appropriation available for the maintenance of the penitentiary; therefore, claims for supplies can only be audited by the Secretary of State, and certificates of evidence issued to claimants. As soon as there is an appropriation available, warrants will be issued in lieu of the certificates.
