PRETENDED TO OPERATE

Oran Hoskins, the "paralyzed" youth of Fort Worth, Texas, had been awarded \$35,000. True, the Hoskins verdict was afterward revoked because an attorney came forward and testified that, long before his accident, the boy and his mother had come to him and asked what chance there would be for good damages if an accident like the one that afterward occurred should take place, and because when a doctor who had previously believed in Hoskins pretended to operate upon his brain, the boy, who had seemed blind, deaf and altogether inert, sprang from the operating table and confessed.

There was the case of the Chicago woman who claimed to be the sister of a prominent lawyer whose partner is an ex-cabinet minister. She was suing the street car company for many thousands of dollars with a good chance of recovering. There was the case of the man who stood on the platform of an M. K. & T. train at Hillsboro, Texas, and saw another man crushed beneath the wheels. He was suing the railroad company for \$5000 because of the "horror and mental anguish" he was subjected to. There was the Chicago woman of shady reputation, who had injured her thumb on a street car, who had blackmailed more than one prominent man, and whose father was serving a life sentence for murdering her mother. She was suing for a big sum. It All Comes Back to the People.

No, such things were in the air. Egged on by political and sociological issues, the public in general and the Chicago public in particular had come to regard baiting the corporation as a purely defensive public measure, in which at least there was no sin. True, the city itself is a corporation from which every citizen draws large dividends in free police protection, in free sewage removal, in free schooling, and if you bait it you simply rob it of just so much of its capacity for giving you what belongs to you.

True, the street railway company is a corporation which gives you more for your nickel than you could buy for a dollar in cab service, the railroad company more for a dollar than you could buy for ten in stage coach service, and if you bait them you reduce by so much their capacity for contributing to your comfort. For, as a prominent railroad official pointed out, every excessive or unjust judgment that a railroad is called upon to pay increases its operating expenses just that much, and to that extent prevents a reduction either voluntarily or enforced, of the rates of fare and freight; so that in the end the general public, or those who use the railroads, pay or contribute toward the payment of such judgments.

The corporation is, in effect, the application of the republican form of government to private business. Your petty business man is an absolute monarch, and may chop off the heads of his employees with let or hindrance. He may do so as much as it pleases his personal whim. But how long would a presidential policy of this arbitrary nature be tolerated by that leavening body, the board of directors, which corresponds to the congress of the United States. If governmental paternalism were to be substituted for corporate control of railroads, would the corporation baiters cease their efforts?

The substitution of municipal for private control of the street railways of Chicago will shortly furnish an answer to this interesting question.—"The Profession of Getting Hurt," in the July Pearson's.
