SALEM GIRL SELECTED

Miss Helen Calbreath Elected Dean of University College of Music

Miss Helen Calbreath, daughter of Superintendent Calbreath of the asylum, has been elected as dean of the Willamette University College of Music, in place of Prof. Seley, who has recently resigned, and who has had charge of that institution for a number of years.

Miss Calbreath's selection is good one, for she has not only studied under artists of note, and is a musician of ability herself, but she has also demonstrated that she has great ability as an instructor. She also possesses executive ability and brings with her into her work no end of enthusiasm.

The entire staff of instructors is being changed, and the old school will never have had such a competent corps of instructors as she will have to present to the people of Salem this year. Mr. William Wallace Graham, who is not totally unknown to Salem people, will be principal of the violin department. Mr. Graham was a student in the Hochschule, of Berlin, Germany, and was a private pupil under Joachim, and also studied under Mertel. In all he spent seven years studying in Europe, and is now considered the best violin teacher in Portland. This department of the musical college has been rather neglected in the past, but now it will not only be revived but strengthened. He will add to the course ensemble playing and symphony orchestra.

Miss Evelyn Hurley will have charge of the vocal department. Miss Hurley has spent 13 years preparing herself for her chosen work, and is well fitted for the position she is to occupy. She has studied under some of the best teachers in New York, and was chosen over 75 voices as the leading soprano in Ben Hur. She had many flattering offers made to her to remain in the East, but she preferred to return to Oregon, in order to be near her people. Miss Hurley is an Oregon girl, being the daughter of Hon. Hardwell Hurley, who held the position of circuit judge in Portland for a number of years. She will sing at the Methodist church tomorrow morning and evening. Another member of the faculty will be Miss Eva Cox, who has been a successful teacher in Salem for some time. Miss Cox studied in New York, and was a student of Prof. Winkler. She will be an assistant in the piano department.

The remainder of the staff will be chosen and announced later.

CHILDREN CRY FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA.

Leper Cannot Be Punished.
Honolulu, June 28.—A case probably without a precedent in legal history has been brought to the attention of the United States district attorney for the district of Hawaii. The postmaster at the leper settlement on the island of Hawaii has been accused of sending a package addressed to one of the lepers at the settlement. The evidence is said to be absolutely complete as to the guilt of the accused, but the question is how to try him or carry out the judgment of the court if he could be convicted.

The postmaster is a leper. Even if a special session of the United States district court should be held at the settlement to try him and he should be convicted and sentenced to imprisonment, it is not known how the sentence could be carried out. There is no prison in the leper settlement where he could be confined, and it is doubtful if as a leper he would be received at any other prison in the world. By force of circumstances it is believed he will have to be let alone so far as criminal prosecution is concerned.
