There has been a serious blunder made by some one, which should be corrected at the earliest opportunity."

HENEY DIGS UP LETTERS

Portland, July 8.—Green and Henry Beard, two entrymen of the Gesner lands, testified today. They said they were induced to file on the lands by Gesner, with the understanding that they were to sell to him after making final proof. It is charged that these witnesses had been seen by the defense, and offered money. A damaging letter from Gesner to Henry Beard was introduced, advising the relinquishment of his claim when he became alarmed at the government investigation.

Portland, July 8.—Admissions damaging to the defense were made this morning in the trial of Congressman Williamson, et al., by Campbell Duncan Green Beard and Henry Beard, who stated that they had made timber entries at the request of Van Gesner, who advanced the necessary money. He received \$75 for filing, Gesner indicating the land to be entered. Henry Beard admitted he had perfected himself in making final proof. A letter from Van Gesner to Beard was introduced, wherein the latter was advised "the department has tip, relinquish the claim, and get out of trouble."

AVOIDED POLITICS

Chicago, July 8.—With the election of officers for the new organization known as the Industrial Workers of the World today, Eugene Debs and his followers saw an end of their hopes of affiliating the order with the socialist party.

The election was a complete victory for the western clique, under the leadership of David Coates, which opposed the political idea. The officers elected were: General president, O. C. Sherman, Chicago; secretary and treasurer, Will E. Trautman, New York; executive committee, Charles Moyer, Frank McCabe, Charles Kilpatrick, F. W. Cronin, John Reardon. One hundred and ninety-nine unions, with 142,000 workers were represented in the convention.

Strange Present to the Czar.

St. Petersburg, July 8.—A preposterous offer was recently made by a Persian noble to the czar. Last spring a Persian grandee, in close touch with the Shah, paid a visit to St. Petersburg, and was accorded an informal interview by Nicholas II. The conversation, it is said, turned on the beauty of Persian working-class women, and the visitor offered to send the czar samples to see for himself. The czar, thinking that this meant a gift of photographs or pictures, thanked his Oriental visitor. Straightway the matter passed from his mind. Recently, however, Czarskoe Selo was electrified by the arrival of a body of eight beautiful girls, selected from among the water carriers of Teheran. They were a present to the czar from his Persian visitor. Nicholas has returned the band of beauties from whence they came, with an autograph letter of compliments and thanks.

CHILDREN CRY FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA.

Twins 88 Years Old.

Bridgeport, Conn., July 8.—Junius N. and Julius H. Benham, probably the oldest twins in America, today 88th birthday by giving a shore dinner to the numerous relatives and friends. The two brothers were born July 8, 1817, at Middlebury, Conn. They came to this city early in life and for half a century have been prominent in the building industry. They came from a long lived family. Their grandfather lived to be 94. Their father was 88 at the time of his death and their mother lived to the age of 96. Their only brother died at the age of 86. They are strictly temperate and regular in their habits and all their lives have been industrious workers. Both men are over six feet tall and not only look alike, both having snow-white hair and beards, but also dress alike so that it is almost impossible to distinguish one from the other.

London, July 8.—Miss May Sutton, of Pasadena, California, wrestled the all-England ladies' championship from Miss K. Douglass, holder of the title and cup in the grand challenge round at Wimbledon today.

Only two sets were necessary to decide the title. The first was won 6-3, and the second 6-4. Miss Sutton won almost entirely by forehanded drives, which completely baffled her opponent and literally wore her out.
