They honestly believe that all such legislation is unjust to the corporations, and that such laws should be set aside.

Therefore men who have at least been trained on both sides of the corporation question should be appointed to such places.

The Journal is not censuring Senator Fulton for recommending W. W. Cotton for judge to succeed Bellinger, as Cotton was wanted by the administration, and was not Fulton's first choice.

TO ATTRACT ATTENTION.

New Devices Being Added to Cash Registers.

All the modern cash registers embody some form of indicator operated by the keys which displays to the purchaser the amount of the sale. It has been found that this in itself is not a sufficient safeguard, and various attachments are now being added to attract the customer's attention to the machine at the time the amount of cash received from him is registered by the operating clerk. One rather promising scheme is to give the indicator card an oscillatory motion, which continues for some seconds. The backward rocking movement of the disk naturally attracts the attention, and this may be further fixed by employing a pictorial device of some kind, such as catchy advertising mottoes. The mechanism by which this is accomplished is comparatively simple, and to all intents and purposes the registering attachment does not differ in appearance from that of the usual type.

FAILURES FOR SIX MONTHS.

Show an Encouraging Decrease Over Last Year's Liabilities.

Washington, D. C., July 15.—Commercial insolvencies in the United States in the first half of 1905, were 6,210 in number, and \$55,904,585 in amount of defaulted indebtedness. Numerically this shows scarcely any alteration in comparison with the 6,214 failures in the corresponding six months of last year, but a most encouraging decrease appears when last year's liabilities \$79,490,909.
