NEW YORK FASHIONS

New York, July 15.—The all white frock is always through the summer months and, although this is not emphatically a white season, every wise woman has at least one sheer white frock in her outfit. If she can afford but one dainty sheer frock, by all means let it be white. Nothing else launders or cleanses so well, nothing else is so generally becoming, nothing else can be worn so often without becoming a tiresome story.

Batiste, the fine lawn, dotted and embroidered Swiss plumes and mull are the thin white lingerie stuffs dear to the summer girl, and the lawn, though often beautifully fine and possessed of excellent wearing and laundering qualities, have of late yielded precedence to the materials of softer finish. Valenciennes is inevitable upon the sheer lingerie frock, but it is often used merely to soften the lines, while by-the-yard embroideries assume the responsibility of the chief trimming.

The triple skirt, returned to favor this summer, is a good model for the embroidery trimmed lingerie frock, wide embroidery flouncing, upon batiste or other very soft material, being used for the three skirt sections. In a pretty model displayed in one of the large stores, batiste was the chosen material and the skirt has a triple one formed of three flounces of batiste embroidery finished on the edge with large scallops and with an embroidered design of heavy raised dots set in circles, one circle within another.

To the bottom flounce of the unlined skirt was given a straight edge by laying a deep scalloped edge flat upon a broad band of batiste inset with bands of narrow valenciennes, and sewing it firmly. The middle point of each scallop touched the bottom edge of the hem, but between scallops the open spaces showed the bands of valenciennes and batiste.

Some such device is necessary wherever an unlined skirt is made of scalloped embroidery, but frequently a little frill of the material, lace embroidered, is set just under the scallops, which rest upon it.

A deep berth of the embroidery set on with tiny verticle tucks trimmed the blouse of the gown under discussion, and the yoke and the whole sleeve were of valenciennes edging. The berth, falling low hid the transparent sleeve above the elbow, but when the arm was raised the soft lace effect was decidedly pretty.

Now is the time to buy embroidery flouncings, insertions, robe patterns, etc., at bargain prices and, though there are new designs in embroidery each each year, there is little chance that the designs of one summer will be noticeably out of date by another summer. The same is true of the good valenciennes edgings insertion and all-overs, and short lengths of these are being sold now at prices that make them good investments. Valenciennes is always serviceable for underwear trimming, even if one does not hold it over until another season for frock trimming.

The white dotted swisses and other embroidered swisses have their perennial vogue, and this summer brought a few very pretty new designs in small figures and in trailing figures combined with the favorite dots. Printed swisses with flower designs over a plain or dotted surface have also appeared in attractive guise.

A pretty frock of this style of white dotted swiss trimmed in valenciennes, extremely simple, yet with a surprisingly chic and knowing air, due to medallions of dotted flower swiss, set into a skirt and blouse with valenciennes insertion. The flower design on a white ground is of tiny wild roses, pale pink and yellow, with their soft light green foliage, and a girle of pale and yellow shot louisine ribbons harmonizes delightfully with the touch of color in the medallions.

Another white frock, more lavishly trimmed, though not so unusual, combines valenciennes insertion and lace and small medallions of fine swiss embroidery in its trimming. On the bottom of the skirt flounce and around the body run alternate rows of inset insertion and frills of lace of the same width, the lace frill falling over a plain narrow band of the frock material. This adjustment of insertion and edging is repeated often upon this season's thin frocks, as is the trimming formed by setting together rows of valenciennes edging, the scalloped edges overlapping the plain edges and sewed firmly down. This idea is well liked for yokes, chemisettes, long, close cuffs, etc., and is a change from the valenciennes insertion set together. The same arrangement of the lace also makes exceedingly pretty berthes, and frills and particularly dainty sets if underwear are made with the berthe and sleeve frills of the low necked

night gown the chemise berthe and the drawer frills fashioned entirely of valenciennes edging set together in this manner.

Elbow sleeves have carried all before them so far as sheer frocks are concerned, and even the woman whose arms are not pretty have resigned themselves to the mode for the thin summer frocks, while clinging to sheer cuffs and undersleeves for their heavier gowns.

The allover batiste embroidery frocks in all white or pale tint or in white or ecru embroidered in all white or ecru embroidered in delicate color have lost none of their prestige, and many of the model frocks of this character are made over soft silk slips in light colors. When the embroidery material is itself of some soft color the lining, or rather the slip, usually matches it, but charming effects are obtained by, say, a creamy open work batiste embroidered in delicate silvery green and worn over either a pale banana yellow or rose petal pink.

Henry J. Denckla, a clerk in the United States mint of this city, left last night to take part in the annual settlement of the mint at San Francisco, where he will handle and count \$175,000,000, says the Denver Post. The settlement will begin about the middle of the week. Part of this immense amount is the new Philippine coinage and is in half dollars, of which \$50,000,000 have been struck out.

Denckla has been employed in the mint for nearly 10 years, being second to the chief clerk in charge. He will be assisted in the work in San Francisco by J. N. Hetrick of Carson City Nev. Denckla's appointment came direct from the director of mints at Washington.

"The work of counting such an immense sum of money," said Denckla,

before leaving, "is quite an undertaking. It will take fully three weeks, and perhaps longer. All the gold coins of large denomination have to be counted by hand. Those of smaller denominations with silver coins, are counted in bags. Five dollar gold pieces and silver dollars and all smaller coins come in bags of \$500 each and out of a large pile of these bags one is counted and weighed. Then all of the others are weighed and if one is found to be lacking in weight all the coins have to be counted. Currency, of which there is very little in the California mint, is either counted bill by bill or in packages of from \$100 to \$500 each."
