Jaurez's Name Is Honored.

City of Mexico, July 18 .- Today was observed as a holiday throughout the republic, being the thirty-third anniversary of the death of Bonito Jaurez, the famous Liberal party of San Ferdinando wherein lie the remains of the illustrious soldier who led the successful struggles against Panama, the Maxmillian empire. The procession included workingmen's societies, government officials, members of scientific and literary societies, officers of the garrison, members of congress and surviving signers of the present constitution. President Diaz and other persons of eminence gathered about the tomb and heaped it with floral offerings.
