Cannibal Tribe in Africa Eats 2,000 Negroes, and 8 White Men for Pie

Berlin, July 19.—The colonial authorities of German Southwest Africa report the outbreak of the cannibal tribe of Njema, in German Cameroons. In June the tribe devoured 2000 negroes and eight white persons. The German forces are too weak to cope with the savages.

Arcanumites May Form New Order.

New York, July 19.—It is now nearly two months since the Supreme Council of the Royal Arcanum met at Atlantic City and decided to advance the insurance rates of the order. This has given sufficient time for the sentiment of the rank and file of the order to crystallize and it now becomes evident that some decisive step must be taken in the right direction or else the order is bound to lose a large percentage of its membership. During the last two or three weeks state conventions have been held in New York, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania and other states, vigorously protesting at the increase in rates which have been made, and in some instances there have been open threats of secession and the formation of a new order. The secession movement has gained great headway and its promoters have even gone so far as to agree upon a name for the new order, that of the Loyal Arcanum.

The rates agreed upon by the Supreme Council at its May meeting advance the monthly payments of members at the age of 40 and beyond from 150 to 500 per cent. To rescind this action seven Grand Councils, each representing a state, must send a written request to the Supreme Regent to call a meeting of the Supreme Council. It is said that the required number of state councils have already made such request, but so far no action has been taken by the Supreme Regent or the Supreme Council in the matter.

The objectors have urged all members to retain their membership until October, in hope that the new rates may be withdrawn. If after that date the Supreme Council fails to take action, it is likely that immediate steps will be taken to form a new and rival order. Those favoring the secession movement declare that more than 50 per cent of the members of the Royal Arcanum are ready to withdraw and join a new order.

Texas Confederate Reunion.

Galveston, Texas, July 19.—The morning trains brought scores of people into Galveston to attend the annual reunion of the Texas division, United Confederate Veterans. Hotels and boarding houses are filled with veterans and other friends, and all indications point to an unusually successful gathering. The interest of the day centered in the opening exercises, which were presided over by Major-General K. M. Van Zandt, of Fort Worth. Addresses of welcome were delivered and responded to and resolutions were presented on the death of former Governor Lubbock. The remaining business sessions, which continue over tomorrow, will be interspersed with many features of entertainment arranged by the Galveston veterans. The downtown section of the city is gayly decorated in honor of the reunion.

Age-Coming of Young Duke.

Berlin, July 19.—Gotha, Coburg, Gernsleben and other cities were en-fete today in honor of the age-coming of the young Duke Karl Edward, the English born Prince of Albany, who was chosen to succeed to the throne of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha on the death of his uncle. The young duke reached his twenty-first birthday, and with simple ceremonies took the oath of regent during the minority of the young duke.

Island Park Assembly.

Rome City, Ind., July 19.—The 27th session of the Western Chautauqua (Island Park Assembly) and Summer School opened here today and will continue until August 11. The attendance is the largest ever registered on an opening day and all signs point to an exceptionally successful session. The programme provides for the usual university study course with competent lecturers and round-table leaders.

Spaniards Want Money.

Madrid, July 19.—The Spanish government is arranging for repatriation to Spaniards imprisoned in the Philippines by the Americans during the war of 1898, who are still in the island.

CARLOAD OF LARD BUCKETS.

And a Few Thoughts Suggested in Contemplating Them.

Arm Broken and Wrist Dislocated.

Mr. W. B. Duncan, who resides on his farm in Spring Valley is willing to testify to the fact that troubles never come singly. While hauling a load of hay into the barn yesterday he fell off, breaking his right forearm, and dislocating his wrist. The accident is a very painful one, and will lay him up for several months. About this time last year Mr. Duncan received a charge from a gopher gun in his hand, which necessitated the amputation of two of his fingers.

Recommends Test Case.

Attorney-General Crawford handed down an opinion to the city council of Coquille City this morning, in which he states that it would be a very difficult matter to decide the validity of the local option liquor law in Coos county, and he therefore recommended the bringing of a test case before the supreme court for settlement. The courts in Coos county so far have upheld the law, although the saloon element has made strong efforts to knock it out.

A fire near Corvallis last Friday destroyed a barn belonging to M. S. Woodcock. The barn contained 30 tons of hay. Two fine mares and two calves were in the barn, and were burned to death. Nothing is known as to the origin of the fire.

EVEN A MORMON MAY FALL

John M. Cannon Brother of Utah's Senator Arrested for Embezzlement and Forgery

Salt Lake, Utah, July 19.—John M. Cannon, formerly secretary of the Utah world's fair commission at St. Louis, was arrested today at Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada, charged with forgery and embezzlement. Extradition papers are now being prepared, Cannon is the son of President Geo. M. Cannon, of the Mormon church, and brother of former Senator Frank Cannon. He is accused of forging the name of former Governor Wells to warrants. He disappeared late in January, at which time he was brigadier-general of the Utah National Guard.

Tried to Kill Frick.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 19.—Alexander Berkham, the former anarchist, left the western penitentiary this morning, having served 12 years and 8 months for attempting to kill H. C. Frick during the Homestead strike. He was taken to Clearmont, where he will serve a year for carrying concealed weapons. Eight years and four months of the time was commuted for good behavior.

A Young Dukelet.

Gotha, Germany, July 19.—Duke Charles Edward made formal entry into Gotha this morning to take over the rule of the duchy of Saxe-Coburg, Gotha, this being the duke's 21st birthday. The young ruler was met at the entrance of the city by troops and escorted to the palace, where he took the oath of office.

Let's Quit Using Tea.

Washington, D. C., July 19.—Advice from Shanghai announce the proposed Chinese boycott of American goods went into effect today. Consular authorities were unable to allay the agitation.
