Webster's Academic dictionary can be bought for about a dollar. There are others still cheaper.

Leird & Lee, of Chicago, have published a new Webster, that has several hundred new words.

Editions of that work of 750 pages can be bought for from 75 cents to \$2.50 for the library binding.

Dictionaries of that size contain from six hundred to seven hundred pages.

By reading ten pages a day one can go through a dictionary in sixty days and get all the words in general use in the English language.

By taking twenty pages a day a person can get through the English language in thirty days and know all the words in general use.

There is no excuse for remaining unfamiliar with English if one can merely read. Of course, to write the unfamiliar words is a great gain.

During the first week of last January an American forest congress was held at Washington under the auspices of the American Forestry association, which is said to have been perhaps the most remarkable gathering ever assembled to consider the relations of the forest to mankind.
