NEHALEM BEESWAX AGAIN

Mr. Miller of the Portland Chamber of Commerce Has an Exhibit

One of Oregon's most perplexing mysteries of the Oregon mineral field is being revived: Is the great quantity of wax on the sea coast at Nehalem a petroleum product or beeswax?

Books have been written on this subject. Scientists differ over the solution. Some have made careful analysis and pronounced it beeswax, while others were equally positive that it was an ozocerite, which is in effect a crude paraffine. With these answers as a guide companies have been formed to search for the petroleum which was assumed to have thrown off this wax, and fairy tales have been written on the other assumption, telling of the great ship laden with beeswax which went on the rocks there in early times and scattered her cargo along the shore, where it has been tumbled in the surf for more than a century.

A. W. Miller, in charge of the exhibit of the Portland chamber of commerce, has just arranged an exhibit which throws the best light yet shed on this question. Mr. Miller lived in the Nehalem district for a period and was for years one of the most ardent advocates of the theory that the phenomena was a mineral wax which would lead to petroleum discoveries some day. When he went to Chicago in charge of the mineral exhibit of the state he took several specimens of the wax for more thorough test. One expert of the United States geological survey, after an exhaustive analysis, found that the sample submitted to him was beeswax, and this verdict was corroborated by one of the professors of chemistry who was employed as chemist for the Columbian exposition. But a sample taken to the Austrian scientist who had charge of the ozocerite exhibit of that country brought forth the positive statement that the Nehalem product was ozocerite, which conclusion the Austrian reached without analysis, and which was held so tenaciously that he did not think it necessary to make analysis.

Mr. Miller has secured some of the best wax specimens to be had in the Nehalem district, and has arranged them with a large collection of hydrocarbons from all parts of the country. He calls attention to the fact that paraffin is not native, but a petroleum base, or reduced from ozocerite. Alongside the refined paraffin Mr. Miller places the Nehalem wax, showing the radical difference in appearance, and submits the two for any test. In odor there is no resemblance and little in color. The construction of the two differ radically when examined closely, from a more cursory test any one is ready to pronounce the Nehalem product beeswax.

As the subject has attracted wide attention, the exhibits gathered by Mr. Miller will interest a large number of people. Lately there has been a renewal of the effort to have borings made for oil in the district and the argument has been advanced that the wax is an unfailing evidence of petroleum. This argument is backed by the fact that the formation of Nehalem is right for petroleum, and the coal beds near strengthen the expectation.

NEXT CASE FRIDAY

William N. Jones, Thaddeus S. Potter, Daniel Clark and Ira Wade will, on Friday morning next, face the federal court to answer to a charge of conspiracy to defraud the United States in what is known as the Siletz case. The indictment against the defendants was returned on April 8, 1905, and charges that on April 15, 1903, the defendants conspired with a number of old soldiers to take up government land in the Siletz Indian reservation, where the lands were open to settlement. By the terms of the conspiracy, as it is intended to be shown by the government, Willard N. Jones and his associates procured a number of old soldiers to use their rights of homestead entry in taking up a number of choice claims in the reservation tract, under the contract that the lands were to be turned over to Jones as soon as patented. Jones was to furnish money to the men to pay their fees for filing and proving up, was to build cabins for them, to do what cultivation was necessary under the law and to pay all charges. For the use of the names of the men and their ef-

forts he was to pay them a small sum when patents had been secured.

At the conclusion of the Williamson case Judge DeHaven set the Jones case for trial on Friday and ordered that a panel of 75 jurors be summoned to be in court at that time from which to select the trial jury. At the conclusion of this drawing the clerk and jury commissioner were directed to prepare a list of 300 names to be used in the cases yet to be tried.

First Auto in Sumpter

Seymour H. Bell, Dr. C. M. Pearce and another gentleman whose name was not learned, yesterday morning chartered the Palmer Bros. "Red Devil," and, with Chauffeur Combs at the wheel, started for Sumpter. Special trains had no allurements for them, but as this would be the first auto to put in an appearance at the altitudinous mining town they expected to cut some ice. A special from Sam Shannon, the mayor of McEwen, said that they had reached that point, and had seared up 17 runaways, set a number of people to praying who never knew what a prayer was before, driven all the valley stock to the hills. The dust had choked both the machine and the men. He was able to relieve the latter with a few iced beverages, but he could do nothing for the machine, and was afraid from the way that it was groaning that its pains might prove fatal.—Baker City Democrat.

"MOST WISE JUDGE"

Washington Supreme Court Decides a Man is not Damaged by Losing His Wife

Under the laws of Washington a husband cannot maintain a suit for damages for the loss of his wife, according to a decision of the supreme court, rendered at Olympia Wednesday in the Seattle case of Christian Johnson and son against the Seattle Electric Company.

Mrs. Johnson was killed by an accident while a passenger on the street car lines at Seattle. Suit was brought, and the lower courts sustained a demurrer to the complaint, holding that separate causes of action had been improperly united. The King county court held that the action for loss of services, society, nurture and counsel was a separate and distinct cause of action from the claim for recovery on account of funeral expenses and burial, and that the widow had no interest in the first and the son none in the second.

The supreme court discusses the construction of the state law which authorizes a widow and heirs to bring suit to recover for the loss of the husband and provider, and says that with the construction already given of this statute it cannot be held that the legislature intended to confer the right of action upon a surviving husband, else the law would have said so.

"Charles Johnson has, therefore, no cause of action. Respondent concedes he is entitled to recover any amount paid for funeral expenses, but cannot join his action, therefore, with the action on behalf of a minor child for the loss of the mother. In this we concur." The court points out that the child has the right to maintain an action under the statute, but elected to stand on the original pleadings at the time the demurrer was sustained. The judgment is affirmed.

The decision was written by Judge Hadley, and was concurred in by Justice Mount, Fullerton, Rudkin, Crow and Chief Justice Mount. Judge Root having been attorney for the Johnsons in the original suit, was disqualified and took no part.
