

STATE POLITICS WARMING

Many Candidates for Congress are Being Named

Also One State Ticket Proposed for a State Ticket From Eastern Oregon

The Capital Journal prints some newspaper speculation about candidates for congress and state officials. It has but one desire—to treat all aspirants fairly and help conduct the nominating primary election on broad lines. The Journal believes that is the true way to conduct a campaign, instead of trying to shut out certain elements of the party from nominations as was done at Portland in the late city election, and thus invite defeat for the important nominees on the ticket.

(A. W. Prescott, of Salem, in Oregonian.)

S. B. Huston, of Washington county, and B. F. Mulkey, of Jackson, are getting into the race for the Republican nomination for congress in the first district. While neither has made formal public announcement of his aspirations, both have been consulting with friends by letter or in person with a view to securing a good initial support.

Huston is an attorney at Hillsboro; Mulkey, president and professor of history and economics at the Ashland state normal. Until the last two years Mulkey's residence has been in Polk county, and should he ever break his connection with the Ashland normal, he would probably return to that county to make his home. It is in Polk county that his greatest strength will be centered.

Eight men now have under consideration the question whether they shall go before the Republicans of this district in the direct primaries for the nomination for Hermann's seat. They are Walter L. Tooze, of Marion; W. C. Hawley, of Marion; G. B. Moores, of Marion; G. W. Wright, of Linn; W. J. Vawter, of Jackson, and S. B. Huston, of Washington.

The congressional contest has begun developing thus early because one candidate came early into the field and has been working hard for support. Walter L. Tooze, of Woodburn, was the first to make his candidacy known, and for two months he has been presenting his claims before prominent political workers in this district. He has been letting his friends know that he wants the nomination, and has been getting many promises of support. The activity of Mr. Tooze made it necessary for other aspirants to begin work early, lest they should find when they entered the race later that their friends have promised aid to the candidate from Woodburn. Tooze has been working quietly, but earnestly and strenuously, in order to get his forces well in hand before the other candidates become active. His Salem friends say his early work will show results on the day of the primary election. Probably not all of the other aspirants named will finally permit their names to go upon the ballot in the direct primaries. Several are merely talking the matter over with their friends, listening to the advice offered, and will make up their minds later whether the outlook for them is favorable enough to warrant their filing nominating petitions.

It will require the signatures of 480 legal voters of this district to place a

man's name on the Republican primary ballot as a candidate for the nomination for congress.

(W. J. Clarke in the Gervais Star.) Politics have already begun to simmer, and it bids fair to be the next general attraction for the public. Already there are many aspirants for the various offices, and the coming direct primary will be thoroughly tested and tried to its utmost. There is much attention drawn just now to the congressional candidate to succeed Binger Hermann, who, it is conceded, will be relieved. Among those mentioned we note the following able men: Walter L. Tooze, of Woodburn; I. H. Bingham, of Lane; W. I. Vawter, of Medford; Charles B. Moores, of Salem, and others. It is a good lot of timber to select from.

(L. Bush Livermore, Baker City.) Now, here's a little slate that looks pretty good. It is made out of good timber. It may not be particularly palatable to Republicans on the Web-foot slope, but it is good, just the same:

For governor, Charles A. Johns, of Baker City.

For secretary of state, Lot L. Pearce, of Salem.

For congressman, first district, T. B. Kay, of Marion.

For congressman, second district, Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton.

For United States senator, Malcolm A. Moody.

(Junction, Lane County, Times.)

Hon. I. H. Bingham, of this county, is being prominently mentioned in connection with congressional honors. Mr. Bingham is bright and brainy and stands with the people on railroad and corporation matters. Is an honorable and upright citizen and would honorably and conscientiously represent this district. He was a member of the last legislature, and, although he was with the minority in the organization of the house, he was soon recognized for his real worth, and at the close of the session was rewarded as one of the leaders. He is also well acquainted throughout the district, and with the solid backing of Lane county his nomination could be secured. We trust Mr. Bingham will consent to make the race.

ENLARGE SILVERTON SAWMILL

One of the men in Marion county who is employing labor and conducting a successful lumber business is John G. Lais of Silverton and Mt. Angel, he residing at the latter place and having his sawmill at the former. Mr. Lais is a native of Baden, Germany, and has traveled over the world a great deal, but he says he can find no part of the old world or the new that compares with western Oregon or Marion county.

He owns 1632 acres of land near Silverton, and employs 12 men at the mill. He cuts 8000 to 10,000 feet a day and proposes to enlarge his plant next year to cut 20,000 to 25,000 feet a day.

Hot Baseball.

The ball game which took place on the Asylum avenue field yesterday between the Salem pick-up team and the Dallas team was a hard-fought battle, the Salem boys vanquishing their opponents by a score of 22 to 21. The game was interesting in spite of the blistering sun, and the enthusiastic crowd greatly enjoyed seeing the sweat-begrimed boys puttin forth their best efforts to capture the game. Salem was compelled to change pitchers three times. Those called to the center of the diamond were: Rolly Southwick, Tom McHugh and Cal McCombs, the latter pitcher bringing in the winning sepe by a beautifully hit fly to center field. The Dallas boys played good ball, and were not in the least discouraged by their defeat.

Mt. Angel Day at the Fair.

Two decorated coaches and about 100 people turned out Saturday to attend the Portland exposition. The Mt. Angel college band, in uniform, attended, and made the occasion attractive with excellent music.

The Baptists of Klamath Falls will build a \$3000 church building, and the parsonage will be ready for dedication by Christmas. The church will be a modern edifice, seating about 350.

FIGHTING BOND ISSUE

Tax Payers League Oppose Construction of Permanent Bridges For

The bond election contest began early Sunday morning, when the Taxpayers' League had circulars and handbills distributed all over the city, opposing the issue of bonds.

There were several forms of these, and they were carried to every house in each of the seven wards, warning the people of the dire disaster which would overtake our fair city if such a course were entered upon.

Early Monday morning the faithful workers of the Taxpayers' or Citizens' League were at work personally. The campaign was in charge of such war-horses as W. F. Boothby, Judge Maxwell, Scott Riggs and others.

Broadbills containing "Facts, Facts, Facts," and signed "Voter" and "Taxpayer" and "Citizen," etc., were scattered at all the polling places again early this morning, and so far as the campaign was concerned it was all made against the proposition.

As only taxpayers could vote, and only those who had paid their poll tax, the vote was kept down and the laboring man and many of the younger voters were not permitted to participate in the election.

By a change in the election law any city election must now be held with the regular county election officers. So in each ward there were three judges and three clerks of election, or 42 persons in the seven wards, necessitating an expense of \$126 for a mere bond election. This system was generally condemned as useless expense. So many judges and clerks are unnecessary. But when legislative wisdom intervenes, to ask for the application of common sense is too much to expect.

Up to 1 o'clock this afternoon there had been about 30 votes cast in each ward on the bond election. Indications are the total vote will not exceed 400, and the bond issue will be defeated. In order to carry, two-thirds of the votes cast must be in favor of the proposition.

Indications, as The Journal goes to press, are that the bonding proposition will carry in many of the wards, but probably not enough to make it a two-thirds majority as required to insure the bond issue.

DODSON SAVES HIS NECK.

Recommended to Mercy by Judge and Prosecuting Attorney.

Andrew Dodson, who was sentenced to be hanged at the penitentiary on August 11th, had his sentence commuted today by Governor Chamberlain to life imprisonment. Dodson pleaded guilty to the crime of murder in the first degree for the killing of a miner by the name of Dunlap, in Josephine county. A. M. Ingram, who was the real criminal, and who planned the murder, was convicted of murder in the second degree, and sentenced to life imprisonment.

The governor gives as a reason for the commutation that Dodson was instrumental in bringing to justice Ingram, who was the real criminal. Judge H. K. Hanna, the judge who sentenced Dodson, and A. G. Reame, the district attorney, both recommended clemency, and assured the governor that the entire county was anxious for him to commute the death sentence. Dodson pleaded guilty, and did not stand trial. Ingram stood trial, and the jury returned a verdict of murder in the second degree.

Plain Dealer, on "The Preparations Necessary to a Successful Advertising Campaign."
