THE STORK SOCIETY.

Club Which Has the Holland Bird for Its Emblem.

A dispatch from Indianapolis, Ind., says: With the stork as its emblem and "Race Suicide Never" its slogan, the Crokers' club of Waukegan has become of national fame and is beginning to find many imitators. It was organized in October, 1903, and for a time its purpose was secret. Now the members admit that their idea is to popularize President Roosevelt's idea of race suicide.

The members of the club embrace the best people of the little La Porte county. Postmaster Yarger and Township Trustee Gross are prominent members. The educational interests are represented by Prof. Farnam, at the head of the town's public school system. Nearly all of the business and professional men belong to the club.

Married women are included, but the younger girls and single women are positively barred.

Public attention was first directed to the club by the remarkable increase in the families of members. Husbands and wives who took memberships became fathers and mothers. The infant population of the town increased by jumps. Single infants, two pairs of twins and a set of triplets, coming in rapid succession, made a swelling in the population that had not been known for years.

When the Crokers entertained they grew confidential and made their guests conversant with the objects of their organization. Once little stuffed storks were given as souvenirs. As a result of this the stork made visits before the end of the year to the homes of two childless couples, immediately afterward these were taken into the club.

Infantile ailments have so increased in the little city that two young doc-

tors of a neighboring town have been urged to take up their residence there. They have been promised ever increasing patronage.

After the secret was out the club officers decided to popularize their organization further by appealing to President Roosevelt for a motto. This was done and the members confidently expect a letter and motto couched in distinctly Rooseveltian style, complimenting the membership on its effort to popularize the views which the chief executive is seeking to inculcate in American homes.

Baby parties are becoming popular with the Crokers. Prizes are offered for the fattest, the prettiest and the healthy baby. A special prize will be awarded the member or pair of members making the greater family gain in a year.

McKenzie River Low.

A water famine for Willamette valley would be quite as unusual as an ice flow in Death valley, yet old timers opine that this condition is one of the probabilities at present.

According to river men, the McKenzie river is lower at the present time than during the dry period of late autumn last season, which is a bad indication, as this stream receives its source from the snow clad slopes of the Cascades.

Coupled with this disquieting fact comes the information that city wells which ordinarily are copious in supply are already beginning to fall. CROP AND WEATHER REPORT

The past week was the hottest of the season, and no rain of consequence occurred in any part of the state. Fortunately the wind was generally light, and the wheat crop suffered but little damage. In the Grand Ronde valley and in some of the Columbia river counties east of the Cascade mountains late sown spring wheat was damaged by the hot weather, and will probably be cut for hay. The bulk of the crop, however, is safe, and both spring and fall wheat are now being cut as rapidly as possible. Threshing will begin in the Willamette valley this week. All indications point to an extra good crop of wheat, both as to quantity and quality.

Pasturage is getting short, but stock continues in good condition. The flow of milk is decreasing in the dairy districts, but not more than usual at this season of the year. The second crop of alfalfa is being cut, and the crop promises to be about an average one. Hop burs are forming and the vines are growing nicely. Hop lice are still to be found, but they are less numerous than formerly. Corn, potatoes and gardens have made good advancement, but these crops would be improved by more rain. Early apples are ripe. Prunes, pears and peaches are doing well.
