SKIPSErnest Starr Nephew of Con-
gressman in Williamson Takes
"Leg Ball"

Ernest Starr, of Prineville, nephew of Congressman Williamson, and one of the government's most important witnesses against the congressman in the present land fraud trials, is being pursued across the country east of here by a United States deputy marshal, evidently intending to arrest himself from the second trial of his uncle, thus weakening the government's case.

After testifying in the first trial at Portland young Starr came to Eugene, and registered at a hotel here on Thursday of last week. The next morning he boarded the stage for Blue River. The government officials learned of his movements and wired Constable Jack Smith to try and catch him. Smith left here Friday evening and arrived at the end of the stage route Saturday morning, learning that Starr had set out foot across the mountains toward Crook county the night before. Twelve hours after Smith left here a deputy United States marshal from Portland started from Eugene in one of Eli Bangs' vehicles after the fleeing witness, and has not been heard of since.

The government officials are very anxious to apprehend young Starr, and

this afternoon wired the local officers to spare no expense in helping the deputy marshal to find him. Late this afternoon Chief of Police Stiles, accompanied by Eli Bangs, left for the mountains above McKenzie bridge to aid in the search. It is believed here that he may be in hiding with friends in the sheep camps in the mountains.—Eugene Guard.

Which Was the Voter?

Appropos of our city election Wednesday, with its property qualifications of voters, calls to mind an illustration made by the Hon. Benjamin Franklin, philosopher, kite-flyer, some time deceased. In Maryland a property qualification obtained as to voters, a tax on \$30 being required to make the vote reach the ballot box. Franklin opposed the property qualification on principle, and illustrated his argument this way: "There was a man down near Baltimore who owned a jackass on which he paid tax at a valuation of more than the required \$30. For ten years the owner of the animal voted, although he only paid tax on the one solitary jackass. In the course of time, and unfortunately just a short time before election day, the jack died, and the man was denied the privilege of voting. 'Now, then?' queried Benjamin, 'the man's right to vote expired with the jack, and which of them was it that really had the right of suffrage?'"

SPANGLER IMPROVING.

Rouses at Times Sufficiently to Answer Questions.

Lewis Spangler, the Baker City soldier, who was tossed in a blanket and seriously injured last Saturday night, is getting along favorably at St. Vincent's hospital, in Portland. He is still in a semi-conscious condition, rousing at times sufficiently to answer questions asked him, but then he sinks back again into a stupor. The physicians are now hopeful that he will ultimately recover, but say that it will be at least three or four days before he can leave his bed.

No further steps have yet been taken by Lieutenant Haines in the inquiry to find out about the affair. The company leaves tomorrow for Baker City, and nothing will probably be done until it reaches there.

Races at Independence.
