It is evident that the patrons of the Woodburn-Springfield line of the Southern Pacific will not get relief from the present inadequate train service that they desired, and had anticipated. They have asked the railroad company through personal representatives, backed by strong petitions from nearly every town and hamlet on and off the line south of Silverton, for an exclusive daily passenger train service, but were practically told to go home and "grin and bear it," because the railroad company could not accede to their request. The excuse offered is that the service would not pay operating expenses.

During many years past the people have put up with the exceedingly poor service given them on this line and are certainly justified in demanding a change. They are also certainly entitled to a change. The service has been and is now a most serious drawback to the development of this part of Oregon. The people will not submit to it any longer than they can possibly help. They practically furnished the money with which the present railroad was constructed, and if it be-

comes necessary they can build another to compete with it, or at least assist. If the Southern Pacific will not do something for this section, other means will be found that will. The people are thoroughly in earnest and propose to keep the agitation up until something is gained in the way of transportation facilities that are not a disgrace to the state, and a detriment to the community.

In presenting the matter to the officials of the Harriman lines at Portland, the people of this section were backed up by the State Development League and the Valley Development League, a fact showing the earnestness and seriousness of the request, and that the matter will not down-Brownsville Times.
