Passenger Traffic Heavy.

The railroad traffic which is now being carried on over the S. P. line does not appear to lessen in the least. The trains which pass here are laden to their fullest capacity with passengers going to and fro from the fair. This road is now undoubtedly carrying far more passengers than ever before, so much so, that the trains are behind time very often, and double-headers are used entirely at the present time, as one engine could not pull the heavily-loaded coaches from one station to the other. Before the opening of the fair, it was a very rare sight to see over seven or eight coaches in one train, but at the present time it is seldom there are less than 10 or 12 coaches in one train, besides the two, three and four sections that are coming in every morning.

World Meeting of Friends.

Richmond, Ind., July 29.—The Friends' International Educational Conference which begins its sessions Monday at Earlham college will bring together the best known educators in the Friends' institution throughout the country. Many delegates and visitors are already arriving. The address of welcome on Monday evening will be given by Governor Hanly, and the same evening reports from the Friends educational institutions will be presented by Robert E. Pretlow, chairman of the executive committee of the five years' meeting. During the three days' sessions discussions of topics will be participated in by the leading Friends of the country.

Japs Capture Stores.

Washington, D. C., July 29.—The commander of the flotilla dispatched to Kasei Bay, opposite Alexandrovsk, reports that a landing was made on the 24th, near the Pleskum lighthouse. The deserted storehouses were full of provisions. They proceeded further into the bay, and were fired on by the enemy, who were soon silenced. Subsequently a fire broke out in the town and the magazine exploded.

Had Yellow Fever on Board.

Quarantine, N. Y., July 29.—The Panama Railroad Company's steamer, *Segurana*, arrived this morning from Colon, with several of the crew sick. At Colon four of the crew were landed and sent to the hospital. The surgeon at Colon reported they had yellow fever. Several of the crew have been sick on the passage. The crew is detained, and four have been sent to the hospital.

Mayor McClellan's Vacation.

New York, July 29.—Mayor McClellan knocked off work at noon today and will not resume the direction of the affairs of Greater New York for five weeks to come. The mayor will spend his vacation in the interior of Canada, roughing it and hunting and fishing. During his absence President Furness, of the board of aldermen, will be acting mayor.

Cotton Leak Scandal.

Washington, July 29.—United States Attorney Beach, in charge of the investigation of the cotton leak scandal, has been in conference with Acting Secretary of State Adee. It is understood Beach has requested that government agents be placed on the track of Edwin H. Holmes, Jr., said to be in Canada, and John Hyde in England.

Not Much of a Scrap.

St. Petersburg, July 29.—The official list of the casualties of the recent four days' rioting at Nizza Novgorod shows 16 killed and 53 injured.

Marion County Schools.

County Superintendent E. T. Moores yesterday afternoon filed his annual report at the office of the state superintendent of public instruction, and the following summary will give Journal readers a good idea of the condition of Marion county schools:

Number of persons between 4 and 20 years of age in the county: Males, 5197; females, 5013; total, 10,210. The number of pupils between 4 and 20 enrolled: Males, 3292; females, 3120; total, 6412. Number of teachers employed: Males, 43; females, 172; total, 215. Number of districts in the county, 118; number of school houses, 124; number built during the year, 5; average number of months taught, 6.94; number of local institutes held, 4; number of library books on hand 5505; number of books purchased during the year, 378; number of private schools, 6; number of pupils enrolled, 562; estimated value of school houses and grounds \$211,543.95; estimated value of school furniture and apparatus, \$37,378; amount of insurance on school houses and other property, \$65,165; average monthly salary of male teachers, \$54.74; female, \$40.02; receipts during the year, \$129,593.02; disbursements, \$115,831.62; cash on hand June 19, 1905, \$13,761.40.

Salem Woolen Mill Store**STARR IS CAUGHT**

Ernest Starr, it is reported, has been located in a sheep camp on the eastern slope of the Cascade Mountains, and will be taken in custody early this morning by one of the government officials, who is on his trail. Starr is the nephew of J. N. Williamson, who disappeared in the fastness of the mountains east of Eugene on Thursday last, and who has been sought since that time by ten officers in the service of the government. It was announced by the prosecution in stating the case when the present trial opened, that Starr's testimony would prove conclusively that Williamson was connected with the conspiracy, and that

contracts had been made for the sale of the lands to the sheep firm. The disappearance of the witness weakened the case of the government, and he has been sought earnestly since the opening of the trial.

If there is no hitch in the proceedings it is thought that Starr will reach Portland either this evening or Sunday morning, when, if it is not too late, he will be placed upon the witness stand.

Landed on the Stove.

There was a sensation in Judge Purdin's kitchen the other day. Mrs. P. was engaged in her usual culinary preparations for the next meal, when suddenly a 100-pound specimen of male humanity came crashing through the ceiling and alighted upon the hot stove. He didn't stay there long, however. When the good lady recovered from her surprise she recognized the intruder to be Bob Grace, who was

employed in making repairs to the house by the Iowa Lumber & Box Co. He had made a false step and had fallen between the joists, breaking through the plastering with the above result. Now the contract didn't call for any repairs or alteration to the kitchen, and the judge don't know whether he will be able to collect damages for the hole made by Green through the ceiling, or whether he will be compelled to pay extra for an alteration not mentioned in the contract. —Medford Mail.

Fred Andrews, foreman on the White Horse ranch, was stabbed in the back of the neck by a man called "Red" Wednesday, and expired in 30 minutes. "Red" fled, but was soon pursued by a saloon keeper, and caught after a chase of 40 miles. He was brought back to Burns, and will have to answer the charge of murder.
