

CROWDS VISIT NEWPORT

Journal Editor Likes Salt Water but Draws the Line at Kelp and Jelly Fish

Newport, Or., July 30.—The crowds here are increasing and from 90 to 100 come over every day. The number of campers are doubling up, and in spite of the prediction that the Portland fair would depopulate the Oregon summer resort the crowds on the beaches are nearly as large as in other years. The popular Sunday excursions are a great success and the train that leaves Albany Sunday morning at 7:30 is really the finest way to come over the bay in hot weather. You can go up to Albany in the evening and stop over night and the crowd is not at all boisterous coming over. You arrive at noon at Newport and the rest of the day can be put in on the beaches, the train returning after supper in the evening.

For several days there has been a southwest wind and hence the air has been balmy and foggy. The beaches have been very pleasant for strolling and wading parties. Many have taken drives to the lighthouse and Otter Rock. Thursday a Portland young lady fainted on the beach while in bathing. She was carried out and laid on the sands, where rubbing soon revived her. There was no fault in the surf, although the breakers were large and ugly, considering that there was no northwest wind. She is said to be subject to fainting spells and in due time revived. A few suggestions from a chronic surf bather might not be out of order to ensure success in this delightful resort. It is well to bathe the hands and face and wet the head at the bath house, and then again after you have gone in a little ways. This tempers the lamb to the chilly water of the Pacific that is at no time too warm. The day the young lady fainted it was nasty as could be, the waves breaking with a sharp slap on your back and plunging up a great deal of sand and seaweed. A good schooner of the mixture taken down unawares makes itself felt throughout the interior and your ribs have to be pretty sound to stand the effect of this kind of bludge water. I have got so used to drinking a quart or two every time I go in that I don't mind. I generally spit out the seaweed and pieces of kelp leaves and jellyfish that happen in on the tide.

It gives them all an equally chilly reception, a bracing appetite and a bronzed complexion. If your feet get so numb you can't stand on them just go right on bathing; after a while your feet will come into existence again and you will be able to walk ashore and receive the admiring glances of the hundreds of people lined up to see you make your acquaintance with the brine deep. A special to the Indianapolis News from Marion, Ind., says that after a hard fight of seventeen years against competitors who advertised, Gunder Bros., dry goods merchants, the oldest mercantile firm in Marion and at one time the largest retail house in northern Indiana, have given up the hopeless struggle and sold out their business.

When gas was discovered in Marion the town began to grow rapidly, and competition in all business was soon encountered by all the old local merchants. The new merchants advertised, but many of the old established firms were slow in believing that it was necessary for them to use printers' ink, as they knew nearly every man in the county. All of them who are now in business concluded that it was necessary to advertise in order to hold what trade they had and to increase it, except Gunder Bros., who absolutely refused, claiming it was money thrown away. The firm had the best business site in the city, but the store was never filled with shoppers. Thousands passed and repassed the place day after day without stopping. The firm carried an excellent line of goods and treated customers well, but only a few farmers and some of the old citizens of Marion patronized the place. The store is now closed for in-

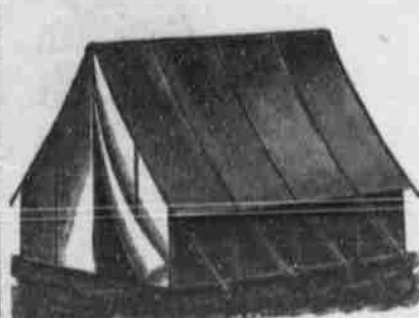
