**How San Francisco Grows.**  
Registration in San Francisco for the primary election, to be held August 8, closed Wednesday night with the unprecedented figure of 87,734.

The net registration for 1904, after all errors had been corrected, was 81,576. But that was a presidential year, when a large registration was to be expected. This is an "off" year and should be properly compared with 1903, when the registration was only 73,280. There is apparently the great gain of nearly 14,000 voters in two years.

It should be borne in mind that the present registration is merely for a primary. For the municipal election, to be held on November 7, voters may continue to register up to September 27. It is, therefore, highly probable that the figures for this year will reach 90,000 in round numbers.

On the usual proportion of one to five this stands for a population of 450,000 for the Bay City. The census of 1900 gave San Francisco a population of 342,782, consequently there appears to have been a gain of over 100,000 in five years. At that rate the city will have over 500,000 inhabitants by the census of 1910.

The present estimate of 450,000 is in accordance with the estimate previously made on other bases of calculation, such as the directory, building operations and other data.

Nor is it unreasonable on general principles. At last San Francisco has felt the impulse of new life. Since 1880 its progress has been slow compared with many American cities. It was on the rugged western edge of the United States and out of the line of increase.

The Spanish war, the acquisition of the Philippines and the advancement of American interests in the Pacific and the Orient have put San Francisco in the midst of things. Nature intended it, by geographical position, to be one of the world's great cities and it is now working toward its manifest destiny.—San Jose Mercury.

**Prune Crop Short.**  
Manager Johnson, of the Benton County Prune Company, states that, in his opinion there will not be 500 bushels of prunes in the entire orchard of 150 or 160 acres. The outlook for prunes is so poor that the big dryer will not be started at all this year. Not only is the crop a failure in the big orchard, but there are little or no prunes in the smaller orchards in that section. D. C. Rowe, who has a small prune orchard west of Corvallis states that he will have about a third of a crop of fruit this year. Of late those who thought they would have half a crop or thereabouts have changed their minds on this point, owing to the fact that the fruit is dropping from the trees to considerable extent.—Corvallis Gazette.
