Status of Trades Unionism.

Unionism itself has not been proved wrong by its recent failures. Its noble tendencies are as strong as they ever were. But errors in judgment by ignorant or willful labor leaders have made it possible for capital to temporarily blind the eyes of the public to its fundamental issues. Capital is sower in culture than labor; with a bow and a gentle word it can make rude-voiced labor seem to be in the wrong. Capital, moreover, is on the defensive, and enjoys all the advantages of fortification. But suppose one tests the inner tendencies, conscious of unconscious, of capital and labor, by asking which is the more deeply in accord with true American principles. With full cognizance of the apparent tyranny of the unions, the answer must be "Labor." Union "tyranny" bears the same relation to the union cause that military discipline bears to an army that is fighting for freedom. As

labor advances in its organized achievement its roughness disappears. It is fighting for more money and more leisure; the result, in the coming generations, can be only more education, more freedom, more light. Today we may note as an indication of tendencies that union labor is doing more to assist the assimilation of immigrants than any other one factor, unless we except the public schools. Capital, on the other hand is, as a rule, becoming actively inimical to the Americanization of immigrants. Since the anthracite strike of 1901, for instance, many coal operators have adopted a policy of dividing the nationalities among their employes in such manner that there can be but little intercommunication among them. The unions would bring the newcomers together; capital would keep them apart, would prevent coalition. The significance of this situation requires no comment.—Public Opinion.

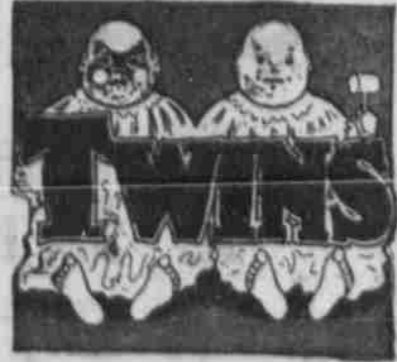

CLOSED TOWN SURE

Bread, Funerals, Medicine and Church Are Pendleton's Only Privileges

As the result of an ordinance adopted by the city council of Pendleton Wednesday night, that place is to be closed so tight on Sundays that practically the only things permitted will be churches and funerals. By the provisions of the ordinance, all business houses and places of amusement are prohibited from being open and doing any business. The exceptions made are that drug stores may sell medicines only; bakeries bread only; livery stables furnish teams for funerals and undertakers may conduct funerals. Consequently no ice cream or confectionery stands may be run; neither ice nor meat may be sold or delivered, nor a team secured from a stable. The penalty for violations of the new ordinance is a fine of not over \$100, imprisonment for no longer than 50 days, or both.

The ordinance was adopted by the council at the instance of those who are opposed to the closing of saloons on Sundays, and is designed to close every form of business, out of revenge for the enforcement of the Sunday law against the saloons, which has been ordered by the district attorney. Last Sunday the saloons all remained open all day, and on Monday a complaint was made to the district attorney by members of the Law Enforcement League, with the result that an order was issued forbidding saloons to remain open in the future, on penalty of being prosecuted.
