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Mr. Toose and the Tariff.

How to Treat a Balking Horse.

It is a very practical question, what to do when a horse balks.

Some drivers get mad, and go to abusing the horse. That shows lack of sense.

Generally the horse is less to blame than the driver. It is mostly the driver who balks.

Ed. Davis, a Salem express driver, has a horse that was a chronic balker or three years ago, when he took it.

It has never balked since he has had it, and his rule for curing a balking horse is very simple.

Mr. Davis says he just talks to the horse that balks as if he wanted it to stop.

Generally horses balk because they have been over-pulled or over-excited.

He says stop him just as you would stop anywhere. Let him rest a minute or two.

Turn the wagon. Get a new swing on it. Take time to get the confidence of the horse. Tell him to stop several times, and if he is a real balker he will start just to be perverse, like some people.

Adrenalin From Coal Tar.

An article in the Journal of Physiology by H. D. Dakin, of the Lister Institute, who says he has discovered how to prepare adrenalin from coal tar products, has attracted much attention in England. Adrenalin is the active principle of the suprarenal capsules of the body. These little organs which are liked cocked hats in shape, are situated one above each kidney. Until 1893 their purpose was unknown, though it was shown that they were essential to life, for if they become diseased muscular prostration and death followed. In 1893 Professor Schaffer and Dr. Oliver obtained from these glands a very active juice which from its powerful effect on all the muscles made many regard it as the body's natural tonic. Takamine, a Japanese scientist, in 1901, obtained an active principle of this juice in pure crystalline state, but until Mr. Dakin's discovery all attempts to produce artificial adrenalin failed.—New York Sun.

LANE COUNTY HOP PROSPECT.

A Veteran Hop Grower, After Tour of County, Gives Opinion That Crop Will Be Short.

Den Linton has just finished a tour of the hop growing district of Lane county, excepting the Coyote and Spencer creek country, and gives it as his opinion that the crop will be short of last year, the few upland yards of the central and east side of the county being especially hurt by drought.

Mr. Linton says the lower part of the Campbell & Walker yard, conducted by J. R. Campbell this season, promises the best crop of any he saw. He attributes the success there met with in running four vines instead of two, as usual throughout the valley, to the dryness of the season, believing that in years of ordinary rainfall the four vines with cross-twinning the wires to train on, would make too rank a growth. However, on that score John Anderson increased the yield of his hops last year from 1200 to 1900 pounds to the acre, putting up three vines, and the season was of the ordinary.

The truth is the ordinary hop grower fails in cultivating his hops. He saves a few dollars an acre in cultivation, only to lose scores of dollars in production. Hops cannot be cultivated too much—instead of hop yards the English call them "hop gardens." Like garden stuff, they grow best with careful and continuous attention. Our growers will reap greatly added profits when they come to appreciate the truth of this statement.

For the benefit of other growers we will state that Mr. Campbell forked about every hill a couple of feet or so back with a heavy, six-tined barn fork, that kind of a fork being used so the fork would more easily feel the strain from caught roots, and avoid breaking them. Then on a couple of acres of a just perceptible knoll, where the hops have been light in previous years, presumably from nearness of gravel to the surface, a splendid crop has been made by the use of a pint of bonedust to the hill, buried in a trench several inches back from around the vines. Observation shows that much of the bonedust was taken up by the soil within six weeks after being placed in the ground.—Eugene Guard.
