The work of last night's meeting in detail is as follows:

The committee on ordinance reported that they had examined the bill for an ordinance to provide for the improvement of South Commercial street, and submitted a number of miner amendments to correct the same. The amendments were read by the recorder and adopted by the council.

When an opportunity was offered for any one to speak who had objections to make to the proposed improvement M. G. Royal stated that he appeared as agent and attorney for a number of residents and taxpayers and presented several pages of typewritten objections from his clienta. The objections were read and filed but no action was taken upon them.

The bill was then passed to third reading and being placed upon its final passage was passed with but two disscating votes. Bayne and France voted ma

The committee on public buildings was authorized to have a plumber examine the city hall to determine the condition of the building.

The committee to which was referred the proposition of constructing a concrete bridge across Mill street on East State street, recommended that the needed repairs on the other bridges be made before the building of any new bridges was undertaken. The report of the committee was adopted.




