NEW MINING FIELDS.

Modoc Lava Beds and Central and Southern Nevada. (San Francisco Chronicle.)

The volcanic character of Modoc county has up to the present time, been a bar to its prospecting for minerals. Its forbidding lava beds and extinct craters and disturbed rock formations have discouraged the mining prospector in the past, and through all the years of mining activity in other parts of the state the county has been neglected as a mineral field and surrendered almost exclusively to the stock raiser and the herder of sheep. But the accidental discovery of a rich vein of gold-bearing ore in the neighborhood of Fort Bidwell is a startling revelation to mining men generally and it has brought Modoc county suddenly conspicuous into the public gaze as a promising field for exploitation—one possessing great possibilities.

It is barely possible that Modoc county may pass through an experience similar to that which Central and Southern Nevada has been having during the past two years or so. Prior to the accidental discovery of the mineralized outcroppings at Tonopah by Butler, that whole section of our neighboring state was shunned by the mining prospector. And yet the gold and silver bearing belts of Tonopah, Goldfield and other Nevada mining districts which have been exploited since the value of Butler's discovery became known have been the wonder of the mining world. The Comstock lode in its best days was not as productive as some of the veins opened in these new mining camps.

The gold-bearing vein located in Modoc county, as the result of the accidental discovery of a piece of rich float by a 15-year-old shepherd while tending his flock, is, according to all accounts, as rich as anything found in any of the new Nevada mining camps. A piece of rock picked up at random is said to have assayed \$2553 to the ton. The ledge is said to be four feet wide and has been traced along the flank of Mount Bidwell, through the outcroppings, for a distance of half a mile. Moreover, gold is said to have been panned from the dirt obtained on the top of the mountain, which is an extinct volcano, at a point a thousand feet above this rich ledge, which indicates the presence of other sources of the precious metal at the highest elevation of the peak. Other ledges have also been found on the mountain and these have been staked off for future exploration. A good vein of copper and free gold has also been uncovered by a fortunate blast put into an abandoned tunnel in the mountain which was driven at some period long

Modoc county may, therefore, loom up in the near future as a large mineral producer, contributing to the testimony borne by Tonopah, Goldfield, Bullfrog, Kawich and Randeburg that it is not safe to condemn any section in these Western States as non-mineral bearing because the surface indications and the geological formations do not happen to accord with the accepted theories of geologists and miners.

Some Uses of Ammonia.

A little ammonia in tepid water will soften and cleanse the skin. Spirits of ammonia inhaled will often relieve a severe headache. If the color has been taken out of silks by fruit stains ammonia will usually restore the color. One or two tablespoonfuls added to a pail of water will clean windows better than soap. A few drops in a cup of warm water applied carefully will remove spots from paintings and chromes. To brighten carpets, wipe them with warm water in which has been poured a few drops of ammonia. Keep nickel and silver ornaments and mounts bright by rubbing with woolen cloth saturated in spirits of ammonia.—National Magazine for August.
