About 500 people gathered on the University campus last evening to witness the game between the Merchants and the Bankers. While the game was rather interesting, and served to arouse a great deal of enthusiasm among the large number of spectators present, the merchants had things their own way, and won an easy victory.

Little Tommy Holman was in the box for the shoeing peddlers, and was at his best, and the few hits secured off of him by the money changers were so far between that they did not count for scores. He made the remarkable effort of fanning out 11 men, while his opponent, Eyre, only caught three men to fan the August breezes. Frank Catterlin, who went in to relieve Eyre for a part of one inning, was too wild to make good, and, after walking several men, and letting in three scores by wild pitches, he again surrendered the slab to Eyre.

The bankers went into the game with a great deal of ginger, but as the score began to pile up on them, they seemed to lose courage, and played in a listless manner. The gathering darkness also interfered somewhat in the last stages of the game.

The first two innings started off in good shape, and the crowd settled down with the expectation of seeing a good game.

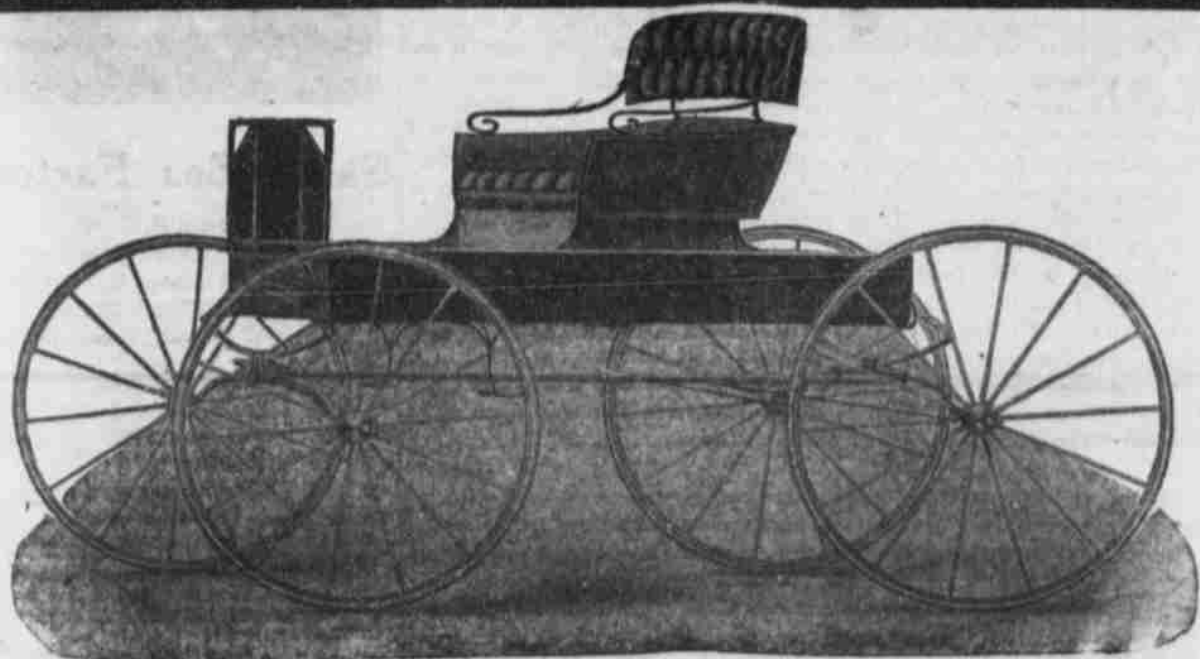

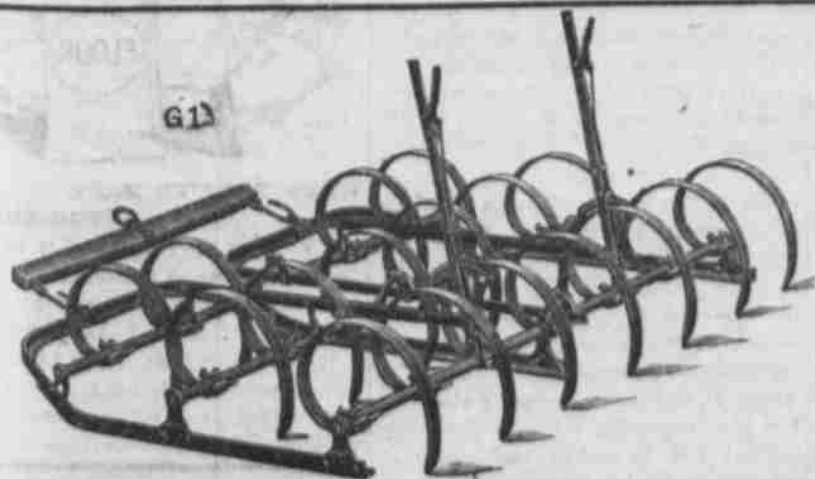

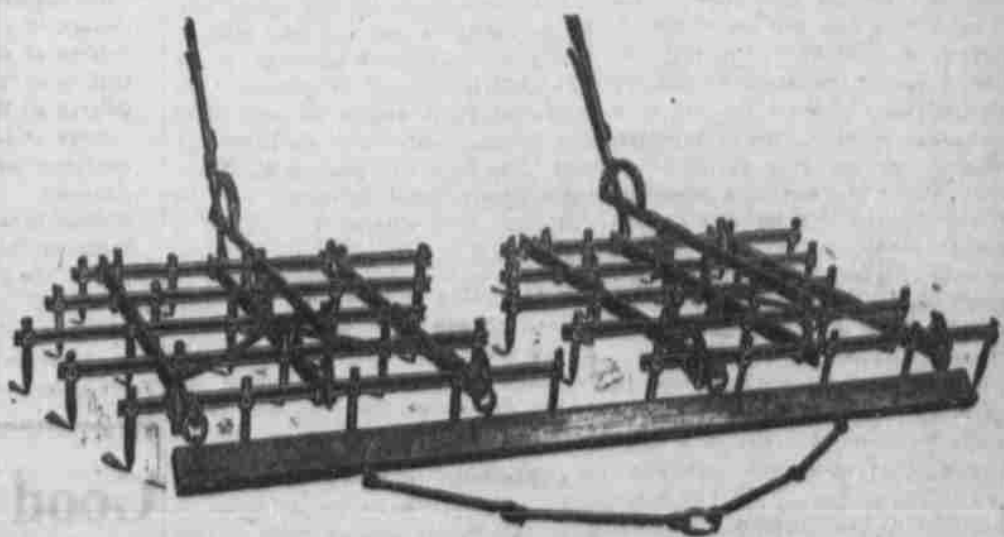
