To Remove a Tight Ring.

If you happen to get a ring on your finger that fits so tight you cannot remove it a very easy way to get it off is as follows: Take a piece of cord or wrapping thread and push one end of it under the ring. Then, beginning just above the ring, wind the cord very tightly round and round the finger clear up to the tip of the finger. Now take up to the tip of the cord that was slipped under the ring and unwind the cord. As the string unwinds the ring will be carried along with it and removed without any difficulty.

ARISTOCRATIC JOURNALISM

Portland's Big Dailies Talk Out of School Quite Naughtily.

"It is sweet for brethren to dwell together in unity," and the contrary of that proposition by the rules of logic should be true. And yet as one notes the joy which personal battle seems to bring to souls, one can well imagine that there is after all a joy of contest, a pleasure in dispute, and a delight in saying "You're another." An editorial in yesterday's Oregonian which we print below, is intensely interesting, showing as it does what the aristocracy of journalism as represented by the morning sheet, thinks of the plutocracy of newspaperdom as sampled by the Evening Journal. It is only fair to add that the plutocracy talks "sassy" right back at the aristocracy, and both are having a real good time. The discrepancy with which the Oregonian alludes to "Ladd's little tin cup bank" is almost irreverent. It says:

"Many times of late little Billy Ladd's organ of plutocracy and franchise grabs has asserted that The Oregonian was on the road to the howlows; that the management was so frightfully bad that the paper had taken the toboggan slide to destruction; that its circulation and business were pretty much all gone; that readers didn't want the paper any more—and so and so on. Now, with proper respect to the man whose greatness lies in the inheritance of his father's wealth, we take leave to say there is excellent reason to believe that The Oregonian is 'standing the strain' fully as well as the Ladd & Tilton bank, and is at least as free from 'mismanagement' and 'degeneracy.' The newspapers of Oregon are The Morning Oregonian and The Evening Telegram. Every one knows that these journals, only, contain the news and all the news. They do more business, twice over, than all other papers in the state; this year they are doing much more than ever before, both in circulation and advertisements; both are more prosperous than at any former time in their history. They do not need the commiseration of little Billy nor the help of his little old tin cup bank, and are indifferent alike to his personal hostility and to the yelp of his hired hounds. The Oregonian began before the day of the Ladd bank, and will last longer, and longer than its subsidized newspaper. No need to worry."

They represent a total membership of about 300,000, scattered all over the United States. The morning session was occupied with the annual address of the Supreme Commander and other officials of the Supreme Council and reports of committees. The work of the convention will be continued in the afternoon. The Knights of Sherwood Forest, which are the uniformed rank of the Order of Foresters, will meet this evening and will hold its annual convocation during the evenings to give the members an opportunity to attend the Foresters' convention during the mornings and afternoons. The local Foresters have made elaborate preparations for the entertainment of the visiting delegates and have arranged for a dance and a vaudeville entertainment at Concert hall on Wednesday evening.

Soldiers and Sailors' Reunion.

Bonaparte, N. Y., Aug. 22.—The Soldiers' and Sailors' Association of Wayne county opened its twenty-third annual reunion here this morning. This morning there was an informal gathering

Big Harbor Horse Show.

Among those present at the ceremony were about one hundred former members of that regiment and a large number of Confederate Veterans from other regiments of Tennessee. Miss Leonora Cheney, daughter of Comptroller H. J. Cheney, of Nashville, Tenn., unveiled the handsome monument. Several interesting addresses were delivered.
