NEARLY FIFTY BUSHELS.

Wheat Yield on College Farm—Rotation of Crops Made It Possible.

A wheat yield of 46 bushels and 40 pounds per acre was produced on the college farm this season. It was a field of 20 acres, on which there were three varieties. The Oregon White Winter made a yield of 46 bushels and 40 pounds, the Acton Winter wheat went 42 bushels and 53 pounds, and the Challenge White Winter, 37 bushels and 7 pounds. The figures are widely at variance with the average yield over the Willamette valley, but they are genuine, and the conditions under which the growth was made are such as may be put into vogue on any farm in the valley. That at least is the declaration of Dr. Withycombe. Oats on the same farm went 40 bushels and barley 40 bushels per acre. No artificial fertilizers were used, except that land plaster was applied to clover during the progress of crop rotation on the fields in question.

Crop rotation is described as responsible for the yield which is more than twice as large as the average crop throughout the valley. The rotation on the wheat land in question comprised two years of clover, a crop of corn, and a crop of wheat. In 1899 the field, which had produced grain almost continuously for nearly 40 years was given 12 loads of barnyard manure per acre. This was ploughed under eight inches. The next spring the land was thoroughly disced and planted to corn, which yielded a good crop for the silo. As soon as the crop was harvested, the land was disced and winter wheat was drilled in. The following March six pounds of red clover and two pounds of Alsike seed was sown over the wheat, and about April 1st 75 pounds of land plaster per acre was applied. The wheat that year yielded 41 bushels per acre. Before that time the average yield had been about 15 bushels. The next year the first crop of clover was cut for silage, and yielded 12½ tons of green forage per acre. The second crop was cut for hay, yielding one and one-half tons per acre. The next year the field was sown with peas and oats and produced six tons of green forage per acre. In the spring of 1904, 15 tons of barnyard manure per acre was applied and the field planted to corn which yielded a good crop for silo. Last fall the field was disced and sown to wheat and last March six pounds of red clover and two pounds of Alsike seed was sown per acre with the result that there is a good stand of clover now, and an average yield of 40 odd bushels of wheat per acre.

Dr. Withycombe maintains that the same conditions may be attained on large as well as on small farms. If barnyard manure is not available the growing of the legumes as rotation crops will steadily improve the fertility of the soil. The farms of the Willamette valley are by no means exhausted. If leguminous crops were more generally grown so as to maintain a good percentage of organic substance in the soil, the crops of this valley could be easily doubled within four years.—Corvallis Times.

Good Hope is situated, there does undoubtedly prevail in less enlightened circles some vagueness of conception as to the exact locality of that celebrated headland. Even the gentle reader is faintly conscious of uncertainty and answers with a briskeness not born of conviction: "The Cape of Good Hope! Why, of course I know where it is. Down at the end of South Africa." Gentle reader, you are not very far out, 50 or 100 miles perhaps. And, as you say, it is not of the slightest consequence from a practical point of view.

The Cape of Good Hope lies at a considerable distance from the end and is, in fact, the middle of the three promontories, severally inconspicuous, which jointly terminate a slender peninsula, some 20 miles in length, forming the barrier between False bay and the Atlantic ocean on the west. These three headlands, lying near together and commonly undivided on a map of moderate scale, are locally designated Cape Point. It was here that Bartholomew Diaz first encountered in full force the prevalent southeasterly gales and denounced the rugged, threatening, threefold promontory under the sounding appellation of the Cape of Storms, to be afterward rechristened by pious trustful hearts the Cape of Good Hope. The Cape of Storms, the Cape of Good Hope, Cape Farewell! Is there nothing in a name?
