SUPREME COURT OPINIONS

Superintendent James, of the Penitentiary, Wins the Evans Case

Supt. James, of the penitentiary, won his fourth victory over L. H. McMahon today, when the supreme court affirmed the decision of the lower court in the case of J. K. Sears against O. W. James. Sears was McMahon's client. The suit was brought against the superintendent to compel him to account for, and return to the state treasury money alleged to have been expended by him for his private use. Also to account for and pay into the state treasury the value of services of certain convicts employed by him, and restrain him from further expenditure and use of convicts. The supreme court, like the lower court, held there were no grounds for a suit.

The case of Susan M. Davis, against the city of Silverton was reversed and dismissed. Mrs. Davis won in the court below. The suit was brought to recover damages for injuries done to a stone wall by street improvement. The trouble was caused by conflicting surveys.

In the case of F. P. Harrington vs. A. L. Demaris the form of decree was modified. Harrington won in the court below. This suit was brought to recover damages sustained by the diversion of water from an irrigation ditch. The damages were reduced to \$300.

Walter Whelan vs. L. H. McMahon and A. M. Clough, coroner, was reversed and the complaint dismissed. This was a suit for decree setting off a judgment for \$47, and costs recovered by the plaintiff against the defendant in the justice's court for Salem district, against two judgments recovered by the defendant against the plaintiff in the circuit court for Marion county.

The case of George J. Wolfer against W. S. Hurst and H. A. Hinkle was affirmed. Wolfer won in the court below. This was brought to force a renter to vacate property because of failure to pay rent.

The case of Multnomah county vs. the First National bank was reversed and dismissed. This suit was brought to set aside the assignment of certain tax certificates.

Mrs. James Lyons, aged about 75 years, died at Portland at 12:30 this afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. B. Hill. The remains will be taken to Eugene tonight on the late train, and will be interred in the Walton cemetery.

She leaves a number of children, Mrs. L. S. Rowland, of this city, being a daughter. She was at the bedside when the end came.

DIED.

RUBLE.—At the family home, two miles west of this city, on the Wallace road, Sunday morning, at 8 o'clock, William Ruble, aged 82 years. Deceased was well-known in this city. He is an old pioneer, and has lived in and near Salem for many years. He was a member of the First Christian church, of this city, and at one time was a minister in the same.

He leaves a wife and several children to mourn his demise. Mrs. Thomas Gardner, of this city, is one of his children.

The funeral was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock, at the home, and interment was in Rural cemetery. It was largely attended by the neighbors and friends from the country and in this city. Rev. Davis Errett, of the Christian church, preached the funeral services at the house, and took charge at the grave.
