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MORE HARRIMAN LINES.

Surveyors have arrived to map out a line of railroad that will leave the Southern Pacific main line between Salem and Eugene, cross the Cascades through the Pezra pass and extend south and east.

This is the latest move of the Harriman managers to meet the demand for railroad extension in Western Oregon, and to cancel the influence of the Willamette Valley Development League.

The newspapers that are advising this organization of commercial clubs and business men to do nothing that shall defeat construction of railroads and other development need not worry.

The officers of the league are cool, level-headed business men of the undeveloped interior and Western Oregon and coast counties, and they know their power and propose to use it with wisdom and moderation.

They know they can appeal to the public and to the corporation managers on equal terms of fairness and justice and get support, when radical undertakings would mar their influence with both constituencies.

But let not Mr. Harriman nor his managers in Oregon think that a paper-mache or toy-railroad construction will save them from the responsibility for their full share in the development of Oregon.

Oregon has dealt fairly and liberally and kindly with these great corporations. They are profitable properties with money on the good side of the ledger to the credit of Oregon. There is nothing unreasonable in asking them to extend their lines several hundred miles each year in Oregon.

PEACE HAS BEEN DECLARED.

The Russian-Japanese war has been brought to a dignified termination, if any war can be brought to such a conclusion.

Japan has won renown in the field of diplomacy, as she did on land and sea, and in handling her wounded and caring for her prisoners.

Generous to a fallen foe, her statesmen retreated just enough to make peace possible, and no one need fear that they have weakened their prestige or position.

Like the South African war with England, the Russian war with Japan has revealed the inherent weakness of a great monarchy, and her statesmen can now repair their fences and defenses.

It is untimely for Minister Witte to brag over his achievement in securing this peace. The spiritual power of the whole world was on the side of peace, and helped bring it about.

The later indications are that Japan will get hush-money, prize-money, muck-money, or whatever it may be called, for the care of prisoners, for the construction of railways, and other purposes.

The Journal rejoices over a peace that it predicted would be brought about to appease the financial interests of the world, which could not afford to see a losing war proceed that was lessening the standing of every great monarchy.

The triumph of Japan is substantial, morally, politically and financially, and the Russians have wisely concluded a war that they fought without thorough preparation, and at tremendous disadvantage, but with pluck, persistence and heroism worthy of a better cause.

foundation, and that both absorption and decay can be prevented in the wood by proper chemical treatment. Consequently a revival in wood paving has begun, and many of the largest cities are again trying it.

Few people realize the enormous cost and importance of street pavements. Measured by the money invested, street paving is probably the most important of any single class of engineering construction except steam railroads, the amount invested to date being estimated by a competent authority as approximately \$515,000,000 for the United States. Wood pavement is now made almost exclusively of one or two of the best construction woods, and if it should become popular the drain upon these woods would be seriously increased.—Forest Service Department of Agriculture.

20,000 DEAL.

Sale of the Strong Sawmill Property—Invoice About Completed.

If negotiations now pending have a successful issue, the Corvallis sawmill will soon be in the hands of new owners, and E. W. Strong and family will cease to be Corvallis residents. Since last Friday a big trade has been on, in which Fred Dooty and A. L. Patterson are to acquire the local industry, giving a new sawmill at Independence as half payment on the purchase. Mr. Patterson is an eastern man seeking a western location, and Mr. Dooty is a former Independence man, now an owner in the Portland Box Factory, the Portland Furniture Factory as well as other interests. He was formerly a grocer at Independence.

In the present deal, the terms of the transaction are all determined and an invoice of the lumber and logs is about completed. There has been no exchange of papers or checks, but it is expected that a point will be reached today. If the trade goes, E. W. Strong and family will move to Independence and continue there in the lumbering business in which he has been so signally successful in Corvallis.—Corvallis Times.

SOME ARMY SCHEMES

Wood May Be Promoted Again Over Those Who Out-rank Him

The decision of Major-General Leonard Wood to return to his position in the Philippines is chiefly significant in that it means he will succeed to the command of all the troops in the islands some time next spring. Major-General Corbin, now in command of the department of the Philippines, will return to this country, probably next April, and it is the present intention to promote General Wood to his command.

Lieutenant-General Chaffee, the present chief of staff, will reach the retiring age April 14 next. Major-General John C. Bates, and Major-General H. C. Corbin, the two next officers in rank after Chaffee, will also reach the retiring age in 1906, Bates August 26, and Corbin September 15. Both aspire to hold the office of chief of staff before retiring, so a program has been made up by the war department to divide the five months between the retirement of Chaffee and the retirement of Corbin so as to give both Corbin and Bates two and a half months at the head of the army. Otherwise if the strict order of seniority were followed Bates would be chief of staff from the retirement of Chaffee until August 26, and Corbin would hold the high place less than three weeks.

Upon the retirement of Corbin, Major-General James F. Wade will succeed to the rank of chief of staff, but he in return will retire one year to a day after the retirement of General Chaffee, making way for Major-General MacArthur, who does not retire until June 2, 1909. MacArthur is the last major-general who ranks General Leonard Wood. In the natural course of events, Wood would become the head of the army June 2, 1909. Less than four years hence, and if allowed to hold on to the end of his military career, would hold that office more than thirteen years, as he will not retire until October 9, 1924.

It is true the ranking major-general of the army is not necessarily appointed as chief of staff; that is an office to be filled by the president. It is assumed, however, that President Roosevelt will not ignore General MacArthur when he is called upon to name a chief of staff a year from next April, though he might deem it advisable to give this high office to General Wood.

If MacArthur is named, President Roosevelt will not have the appointing power when Wood comes in line for chief of staff, for the present administration will end March 4, 1909, and MacArthur will not retire until three months later. Of course, the re-election of Roosevelt would solve the problem, and make Wood's appointment practically certain, or if MacArthur should die before the close of the present administration, Wood would still be sure of the place.

Otherwise Wood must depend upon the mercy of the next president, whoever he may be. Should he be a democrat, or a man intensely hostile to Roosevelt and Roosevelt's views, it might go hard with Wood, though it is to be recalled that Grover Cleveland appointed General Miles as commanding general of the army, though he had the utmost contempt for Miles, and always had.
