WILL BUILD ACROSS THE CASCADES

Harriman Begins to Realize the Magnitude and Wealth of Eastern Oregon

Harriman, and not Gould, is the man behind the move for a road from the Willamette valley through the Cascade mountains.

The unearthing of the fact yesterday that a party of seven surveyors and their helpers had established headquarters at Eugene and were working east from there, which to all intents appears to be a Gould proposition, has been followed today by the establishment of the fact that the Oregon Eastern Railway Company, for which road the surveyors admitted they labored, was incorporated recently, and the articles were filed with Secretary of State Dunbar, August 21st, with William Crook, assistant to General Manager J. P. O'Brien, of the Harriman lines in the Northwest; James G. Wilson and H. P. Conner, the latter of the Northwest legal department of the system as the incorporators. The capital stock was placed at \$1,000,000, and it is proposed to build a line from Natron, the terminus of the extension on the Southern Pacific from Springfield to Ontario, completing the long-talked-of road across the state, and branches are also to be constructed to Klamath Falls Agency Plains and Lakeview.

Railroad men are of the opinion that the latest coupe of Harriman explains in a large measure the reason why he steadily refused to extend the Columbia Southern from Shaniko south to Bend, for with the Oregon Eastern he can control that country, and later, if need be, the Columbia Southern can be brought to form a junction with the main line at Bend. The surveyors are working over a stretch of country which has been surveyed several times. Three practical routes are offered through the mountains. The first is along the middle fork of the Willamette, and holds to the valley of the stream, passing to the southward of the military road, and leaving the ridge by a short tunnel. The second may adhere to the course of the military road, and leave the pass near Summit Lake, or a third

is to leave the valley at the mouth of Salt creek, follow the bottom land and banks of that stream to the head, and thence over a low ridge into Lake Odell valley. A crossing is available via the headwaters of the Deschutes.

The original lines run were from Springfield, and the first and second routes were mapped out so that for a distance of about three miles below Rigden's, at which point the second leaves the river bottom, they pass through common territory. The first line retains the river grades and rises rather rapidly to pierce the ridge, holding for the gorge of the middle fork, which is narrow and tortuous at the head. After leaving the first line the second begins rising toward the summit by a two per cent grade. These surveys were carried on through the passes available, and one was continued across the state toward Winnemucca, though another strikes in a more easterly direction further north.

The fact that Harriman intends to connect the main line with a branch to Lakeview would indicate he proposed to cut off Gould from entering the state over a continuance of the Nevada, California & Oregon, which he recently acquired, which is projected from the terminus at Madeline to Lakeview. The Klamath Falls branch would pass through good country, and the line to Agency Plains would prove equally as profitable.

WORK IN THE ORCHARDS.

The Old Question of Wages and Treatment.

We have received the following letter from a correspondent in Eureka, who signs his name like a gentleman: Editor Chronicle: Sir—An article in the Wasp of the 25th of July defends Asiatic immigration on the ground that the fruit-growers and vineyardists of California cannot get sufficient help to gather and cure their fruit, berries, etc., and consequently every year a large amount goes to waste.

I claim, as a man who was raised on an Eastern farm, and has worked on fruit ranches in California, that if the fruit-growers will pay good wages and give men decent food and a decent

place to sleep, that there will be no fruit go to waste for want of help.

I think that if the editor of the Wasp went to some of the vineyards and fruit ranches of the Sacramento, San Joaquin or Santa Clara valleys and worked, as I have, for \$1 a day and found—"found" meaning bringing your own blankets and sleep out in a straw stack or filthy bunk house, and eat food, or stuff they call food, cooked by greasy Asiatics, served in dirty dishes, on dirty tables, he would change his mind and say: "No wonder the fruit-growers cannot get help and the fruit rots in the fields."

Let these conditions be altered; let the fruit-growers pay at least \$1.50 a day for ten hours' work; give their men good food and a good place to sleep, and I guarantee that no fruit will go to waste, and that there will be no need of importing Asiatics to gather fruit in the state of California.

Of course, all ranches may not be alike, but such has been my experience, and it would take a lot more than a dollar a day to get me to try it again.

ANTI-ASIATIC.

The usual wages for help in the fruit harvest, so far as we know, is on the basis of \$1.50 for Slavonians, who board themselves. As a rule they are strong, willing workers, but not so rapid and deft in handling of fruit as most Chinese and some Japanese, who usually receive from \$1.10 to \$1.35 per day, according to the relative amount of work and labor. The cost of good board cannot be placed at less than half a dollar a day, which would make, as our correspondent says, the wages of Americans, with board, \$1 per day.

It is probably all that fruit-growers can afford to pay, with prices of fruit fixed by competition with all other parts of the United States, and the cost of the long transcontinental haul. If growers could fix the prices of their fruit they could raise their wages. It is desirable for all decent men that they furnish their own blankets and sleep out of doors whenever possible, or in tents. If they do not do these things they will wish they had. No precautions which any fruit-grower can take will keep his bedding, beds or buildings free from vermin so long as he is compelled to hire transient help. The "bunkhouses" are an abomination and should be burned. Or-

chardists can afford to supply good sleeping quarters for all men regularly employed, and this is done on small farms. The large ranches have generally deserved all the evil which could be said of them in this respect—especially those owned by rich non-resident owners. A good many of them have recently changed, but all dread the lice and bedbugs brought in by occasional hoboos engaged without knowing their character.

There is no excuse for lack of cleanliness in the food service or for serving food of poor quality badly cooked. Any orchardist who so misuses his employees ought to have his fruit go to waste, and we hope this may happen to every one of them.

That Asiatics are not necessary in our fields and orchards is conclusively proved by the fact that in all other parts of the United States crops are cultivated and harvested without them. —S. F. Chronicle.
