

CAN CLUB DISPENSE LIQUORS

The Question to Be Tried out Its Merits in Town of Albany

A dispatch from our neighboring town of Albany last Tuesday says:

Complaint was today filed in Justice of the Peace W. S. Riley's court, in Albany, charging Andrew Jennings of Lebanon with violation of the provisions of the local option liquor law. Dr. W. H. Booth of Lebanon subscribed the complaint as prosecuting witness, and a warrant was immediately issued for the arrest of Jennings.

This is the first proceeding resulting from last Saturday's raid. At that time Sheriff R. L. White, Deputy District Attorney Gale S. Hill and deputies, armed with a search warrant issued in response to a complaint sworn to by Dr. Booth, raided the building formerly used as a saloon by Jennings Bros. In the building were found a number of men, some of whom were standing in front of the bar drinking liquor when the officers entered. Sheriff White declared all the men present under arrest. Some of the men in the room were among the most responsible and prosperous residents of the county, and they immediately arranged bail in the sum of \$100 for each person and secured the release of all.

This week Deputy District Attorney Hill has been sitting as a grand jury, investigating the facts surrounding the Lebanon place, and examining the men who were found in the establishment at the time of the raid. These men are: Andrew Jennings, Ed Keilenger, S. V. Blodgett, J. W. Ball, W. E. Chandler, J. W. Ray, John Roberts, Perry Scott, E. O. Umerhoffer, D. Jones, John Craft, C. A. Brown, Ed Allen, P. W. Rile, Fred Kelly and George Ray.

Several months ago Andrew Jennings was arrested on a charge of selling liquor in violation of the local option liquor law, and upon pleading guilty was subjected to a fine of \$50. At that time he was running a "blind pig" in that part of the city of Lebanon which went "dry" at the recent election. Jennings then promised to close his establishment. Recently, however, a corporation was organized under the laws of the state of Oregon. The club was stated to be for social purposes, and was named the Lebanon Social club.

Many citizens were not satisfied with the club operating behind closed doors, and complained that liquors were being sold in violation of the law. Last Saturday's resulted, and today a complaint was filed charging Andrew Jennings with selling liquor to George Ray in violation of the law.

The question which is to be brought up for the first time in Linn county is whether a club can sell liquors for checks to its own members, when the sale is made in a precinct which went dry under the local option liquor law. Jennings admits keeping and dispensing liquors in the club, but alleges that he is merely steward of the club, and that the club members themselves own the liquors.

There are many clubs of this nature in Oregon, in both "dry" and "wet" precincts. The determination of their legality under the local option law will be watched with interest.

To File Account.

Upon petition of Sarah F. Putnam the county court yesterday made an order citing D. W. Gibson to appear in court September 11th, at 10 o'clock, and show cause why he should not file his final account as administrator of the estate of Guyan Gibson, deceased.

Off For the Hop Fields.

The annual exodus for the hop fields from Portland has begun. The Southern Pacific trains bound south are loaded with families who have secured camping places contiguous to the hop fields of Aurora, Butteville and other points along the Willamette river. Trains will be loaded every morning this week for up-valley points, and hop picking will begin all over next Monday morning.

The price paid pickers this season is to be \$1 per box, by weight, which corresponds with 50 cents per box by measurement, as formerly. The period of picking will last about three weeks this year, according to growers who are in the city securing help.

"The sum of \$750,000 will find its way into the pockets of the people of the Willamette and Rogue river valleys within the next three weeks," said a prominent hop dealer today.—Telegram.

The Van Dran Case.

Last night's Telegram says: With new clues coming into their possession the police have renewed their efforts to fathom the mystery connected with the murder of Mrs. Kasper Van Dran, about two weeks ago, and if possible capture the murderer. Within the past few days the police have secured valuable information, and now Detective Andy Vaughn, who has been working on the case, is conducting the investigations on entirely different lines than were first followed.

The police refuse to give out any information, because they say the publication of any of the details would injure the case. For the past few days Detective Hartman has been at Pendleton, Or., where for nearly two years Kasper Van Dran conducted a leading hotel.

Christening the Battleship Vermont.

Quincy, Mass., Aug. 31.—The new American battleship Vermont was launched here today in the presence of a large number of invited guests and representatives of the government. Governor Bell, of Vermont, accompanied by Mrs. Bell, Miss Jennie Bell and her younger sister, the members of the governor's staff and many prominent citizens of the sponsor state, arrived here this morning and were received by representatives of the Fore River Shipbuilding Company, which built the battleship. Miss Jennie Bell stood as sponsor and christened the new battleship by breaking a bottle of champagne over the bow when the big hulk smoothly slid from the ways.

The Vermont is a sister ship of the New Hampshire, the Minnesota, the Louisiana, the Connecticut, and the Kansas which was recently launched. The ship is designed as a flagship, and will be one of the finest warships afloat. The arrangement of quarters provides ample accommodations for the following complement: a flag officer, a chief of staff, nineteen ward-room officers, ten junior officers, ten warrant officers and not less than 761 men, including 60 marines. There is a lower bridge both forward and aft and a flying bridge forward, according to the latest design. On the flying bridge is fitted a screen of bronze for the protection of the men at the wheel and there is also a bronze charthouse forward.

There are steel masts forward and aft, the foremost having an upper and lower top, and the main mast a lower top only. Masts are arranged for wireless telegraphy. There is one signal yard on each mast and also a searchlight platform forward and aft with a crow's nest on the foremost.

The armament consists of a main battery, including four twelve-inch breech-loading rifles, eight 8-inch breech-loading rifles, twelve 7-inch breech-loading rifles, and a secondary battery, including twenty 3-inch, 14-pounder rapid-fire guns, twelve three-pounder and semi-automatic guns, six 1-pounder automatic guns, two 3-inch field pieces, two machine guns, calibre 30 and six automatic guns, calibre 30.

The hull is protected at the water line by a complete belt of armor, 9 feet thickness of 11 inches for about 200 feet amidships. Forward and aft of this the maximum thickness is 9 inches within the limits of the magazines, from which point the thickness gradually decreased to 4 inches at the stem and the stern. The magazine and shell rooms are so arranged that about one-half the supply of ammunition will be carried at each end. The total weight of the equipment outfit will be about 355 tons. The legislature of Vermont has appropriated \$5000 for a silver service to be presented to the battleship at some future time. The total cost of the battleship, exclusive of the armament, will be about \$4,212,000, while the total cost will be over \$7,500,000.

FLOODS WASTE TWO STATES.

Electric Storm Deluges Southern Wyoming and Colorado.

Denver, Aug. 30.—Portions of Colorado and Southern Wyoming were visited by an electric storm today which terrified the people and damaged considerable property. At Cheyenne, Wyo., the rainfall was so heavy that water ran in the streets to a depth of two feet in places. Many stores were flooded and a great deal of merchandise ruined. Trees were splintered by lightning bolts and several houses were set afire. The precipitation of rain was the heaviest in years.

At Fort Collins, Colo., the storm was unusually severe in its electric features. The lightning played almost continuously, and the people of the town ran hither and thither seeking safety. In Platt canyon, and particularly in the vicinity of Buffalo Park, rain fell in torrents, flooding the tributaries of the Platt river and washing out bridges in several places. The roads were impassable.

Colorado Springs also received a visitation of the storm. One house was struck by lightning and burned to the ground.

No reports of loss of life or injury to persons have been received.
