HILARIOUS ATTORNEY.

Had Warm Time in Roseburg Tuesday Night—Arrested.

With his face swollen and discolored as the result of two beatings which he brought upon himself by boisterous conduct, L. E. Huntsman, who claims to be an attorney from San Francisco, stood up before Recorder Orentt this morning and entered a plea of not guilty to three charges: Drunkenness, disorderly conduct and assault and battery. His trial was set for next Friday morning at 9 o'clock, with bail fixed at \$150, which he failed to furnish up to 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Huntsman has been visiting with relatives at Dillard. Tuesday he came to Roseburg and proceeded to take on a copious cargo of booze. In the evening he was ejected from behind the counter in Mosier's restaurant, and, as currently reported, a few minutes later was put out of Goodman's saloon, after having declared his intention of taking charge of the place. Going across the street and failing to get into the waiting room of the S. P. depot, he began to abuse the night agent. As a result he got something he was apparently looking for. Undaunted, however, he went to the Central Hotel and attempted to assume charge and one of the proprietors played a tattoo on his countenance. Leaving the hotel, Huntsman went to W. B. Hammit's undertaking parlors and knocked over several casket boxes leaning against the building. Thence he attempted to enter Mrs. D. P. Fisher's home and was ordered away, going into a vacant house adjoining, when Marshal Jarvis arrested him.

Huntsman declared this morning that his arrest was one of the greatest outrages he ever heard of.
