Mr. Tooze is a hard Republican scrapper and has a right to try to get the nomination for congress, and has a right to be placed before the public in the columns of any newspaper.

No Oregon Exhibit. One criticism is made of the Lewis and Clark Fair that is really well taken.

THERE IS NO DISTINCTIVELY OREGON EXHIBIT, OR DISPLAY OF OREGON PRODUCTS AS A STATE.

The Washington and California state displays attract great attention to those states.

But there is no distinctively Oregon exhibit in a building for that purpose.

Each of the two states mentioned makes a magnificent impression for its displays of fruits and other products.

The Oregon county exhibits are scattered and as a whole do not make a lasting impress on the visitor.

One reads "Marion county, Linn county, Polk county," but the word Oregon is omitted and the counties might be from any state in the Union.

The word "OREGON" is suspended - THE WORD "OREGON" IS SUSPENDED AWAY UP IN THE AIR WHERE FEW ARE INCLINED TO LOOK FOR INFORMATION.

If all the Oregon exhibits had been gathered under one building exclusively devoted to that purpose the state would have compared favorably with any.

The Forestry building illustrates what might have been done for all the other important productions.

The Oregon building for the officials and for the purpose of receiving visitors was a happy thought well executed.

But the Forestry building and the Oregon administration building do not make up for the defect in not having an exclusive state exhibit for Oregon products of the farms and orchards.

Of course, a great fair gotten up in so short a space of time, COULD NOT WELL BE PERFECT. Oregon, has erred on the side of excessive liberality and generosity to her neighbor states and they are reaping the benefit.

If the managers of the Oregon exposition had it to do over again they would do a better job. Take it all in all they have probably done as well as could possibly have been expected.

APPLES WILL BE SCARCE

Good Fall and Winter Varieties Will Bring Good Prices

A Salem firm will pay fancy prices for good fall and winter apples. Inquire at Journal office.

Inspection of fruit is now quite strict and apples must be free from worms.

The Dalles Observer says: "Apples are not so plentiful in the local market as they were before the county inspector served notice on the farmers and merchants to sell no more wormy fruit."

The shortage in quantity, however, is more than made up by the improvement in quality, and no difficulty is experienced in finding a sale for apples and pears that are free from disease or insect pests.

The inspectors have evidently made up their minds to enforce the provisions of the new law to the letter, and scarcely a day passes that diseased fruit is not seized and condemned in some county in the state.

This vigilance on the part of the officers may work a hardship upon a few farmers this fall, but it is the general opinion that the law will prove a blessing in the long run, in that it will force the growers to give proper care and attention to their orchards, and place the fruit industry on a profitable basis."

TUCKER HAS SOME CORN.

Earl E. Apperle, a Jefferson reader of The Journal, noticed an account, in a recent number of this paper, of some big corn which is on display at White & Son's store in this city, and sends an account of some corn that was raised up in that end of the county.

He says: "Tucker & Sons have on display a bunch of stalks, none of which are under 12 feet high, and one is 14 feet strong, while the Salem corn is only 8 1/2 feet." Mr. Todd, near Sidney, raised the corn, and was in Jefferson a few days ago, employing tree climbers to harvest his crop."

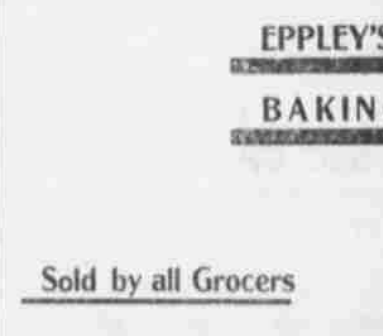
