OKLOHOMA MURDERERS ARE CAUGHT

Reward of \$1,000 Will go to Plucky Baker City Officers

Baker City, Sept. 13.—One of the most notable captures of criminals in Baker county was effected yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Snow and Policemen Tom Merrill and Officer Boyd, when Sam Green and Pete Whitehead, the two alleged murderers, for whom Sheriff Tom Word and Sam Downey, of Portland, were in Baker county recently, were arrested and taken to the county jail. A standing reward of \$1000 has been offered for over two years for the arrest of these two desperadoes.

It was due to the ingenuity and work of Deputy Sheriff Snow that the men were located and landed behind the bars. Sheriff Tom Word and his deputies worked for a week in Baker City on the case without getting their men, and gave up in despair. Deputy Sheriff Snow was not a quitter, and he continued the search. He located the camp on the east side of the river, where the men were stopping, living in a house and covered wagon. This afternoon he made arrangements for the

round-up, and taking with him Policeman Merrill proceeded to the planing mill on Dewey avenue, where Green, a powerful man, worked. Reports had been to the effect that Green would shoot at the drop of the hat.

The two officers walked into the mill, stepped up to Green, and, before he knew what was up, Officer Merrill was holding a six-shooter in his face, while Deputy Snow slipped the handcuffs on him. Green was taken entirely by surprise, and given no opportunity for making resistance.

With Green in jail, the two men hurried to Beggs' stable, where Whitehead was working, and quickly took him into custody.

It was one of the smoothest pieces of work ever pulled off in Baker county and reflects great credit on Deputy Snow, for he has succeeded where the widely-advertised Sheriff Word and his cautious deputies had failed.

Green and Whitehead are wanted in Roger, Mills county, Oklahoma, for the murder of Sheriff Ballard and Deputy Sheriff Coghurn, in cold blood. Green was deputy sheriff of Kingsfisher county at one time. The murder was committed on June 30, 1902, and since that time the men have been fugitives from justice. They came to Baker City in a covered wagon, and have been camping on the east side. The description furnished the officers tallies with that of the two men.

They will be held awaiting information from Oklahoma. The police and sheriff's office will divide the reward if these prove to be the right men.

A Brakebeam Tourist Floated.

J. Jackson, a brakebeam tourist, who had imbibed too freely of the juice which intoxicates, was taken in by the officers last night, and when arraigned before the recorder this morning promised to place distance between himself and the city of Salem. He was allowed to go on that condition.

WERE ARRESTED AT GRANTS PASS

Prof. Frank Haroun, President of a Business College and at One Time Clergyman, Arrested There for Eloping With Mrs. Wm. Lane

Grants Pass, Sept. 13.—A sensation was created among the citizens of Grants Pass Sunday when Prof. Haroun, of Eugene, Oregon, who at one time was prominent as the president of a business college of that city, and who was invited to fill the pulpits many times of the prominent churches in Eugene, was arrested by Night Marshal George Finch and United States Deputy Marshal Bob Veatch and Constable Atkins, both of Cottage Grove. With Prof. Haroun was arrested Mrs. William Lane, wife of William Lane, a prominent ranchman near Cottage Grove, Oregon.

The couple came to Grants Pass about a week ago and registered at the Colonial hotel under the name of Mr. Harman and wife. Mr. Harman seldom left his room, but the lady sold from house to house and among the merchants of Grants Pass soap and toilet articles. Becoming suspicious that all was not right, Mr. Renshaw, proprietor of the Colonial hotel, gave them notice to leave. The couple left and went elsewhere.

Last Friday morning Deputy Bob Veatch and Constable Atkins, of Cottage Grove, came up to find trace of the eloping couple, as they heard they were here. They searched the city, but to no avail, when the assistance of Marshal Finch was asked to aid them in the search. The lynx-eyed Grants Pass marshal soon found out that a small boy had taken a trunk in a small wagon to a Mr. Mitchell, who resides on H street in the part of Grants Pass known as Jerusalem, and the guilty couple were soon located there. It was during the "we sma," hours of Saturday night that Marshal Finch accompanied by the Cottage Grove officers arrested the couple and while Prof. Haroun was taken to the jail, Mrs. Lane was escorted to the Colonial hotel, where she was kept as a prisoner until the morning train north, when they were both taken to Cottage Grove. The trial will probably take place some time during the next week at Eugene.

Since the above information was given to the Herald, the deputy prosecuting attorney, E. S. Van Dyke, of Grants Pass, was asked that the trial be held there, as they were arrested here and the witnesses are here. The authorities of Grants Pass, however, think this is merely a pretense to put the cost of the case on Josephine county, and Deputy Van Dyke has wired to Cottage Grove that they will not accept the case there.

Prof. Frank Haroun is well known in Lane and other counties. He is a man of fine education and has ability as an orator. He has organized and conducted several business colleges and has a wife and several children residing at Eugene.

CAUGHT BY HIS DUSTER

Umatilla Man Is Dragged to Death in Runaway

Pendleton Special: Thomas Bayne met death near Helix by being dragged half a mile by a runaway team. Bayne had been visiting his brother in Adams and was returning home, when he stopped the team about two miles from Helix to repair a rural telephone line. Just as he had gotten from the buggy the team became frightened and started to run away. Bayne's duster was caught by the vehicle, and he was drawn between the brake and wheel. His clothing became tangled up, and he was unable to free himself. The horses dashed on and after running over half a mile were caught by J. Geckling, a farmer.

Bayne's body was in an awful condition. Both arms and legs were broken, one arm being fractured in several places, his skull was crushed and bad bruises were over his body. Bayne was 29 years old and unmarried. He leaves parents near Montreal, Canada who depended upon him for support. He had resided several years in Helix, where he taught school part of the time.

FIRED BY ELECTRIC STORM

Barns Burned and Several Persons Struck by Lightning

The worst electric storm in years swept over Western Oregon the past week. The storm Monday night and Tuesday was preceded by sheet lightning from a clear sky Sunday night.

Reports from Woodburn. Two deaths and two prostrations by lightning are reported from an electrical storm that raged in this section of the Willamette valley, and came to and end this morning.

At Champeeg a boy named Eldredge was struck by a bolt as he passed under a tall tree. A man near him, it is said, was knocked down. The latter did not receive the full force of the electric shock, but was rendered unconscious for several hours.

A report from Hubbard says that a woman hop picker from Portland was standing under a tree to keep out of the rain, and was struck by lightning, and died from the shock. The name of the woman could not be learned, nor could the report be verified.

Accidents at Mt. Angel.

George Caney, a butcher here, was knocked down and stunned by a stroke of lightning. He is still half paralyzed. The large new barn of John English, two miles south, was struck and instantly burst into flames. It burned with nearly all its contents.

Mayor Fred Schwab's barn was struck and one end blown out. Some other damage was done to telephone and light systems.

Burned About Silverton.

A terrific thunder storm, accompanied by a downpour of rain, began last evening about 4 o'clock and lasted for several hours. A barn belonging to H. E. Steen, who lives in the northern part of town, was set on fire by the lightning and burned. Two buildings on the upper Abiqua creek are reported to have been destroyed in the same manner.

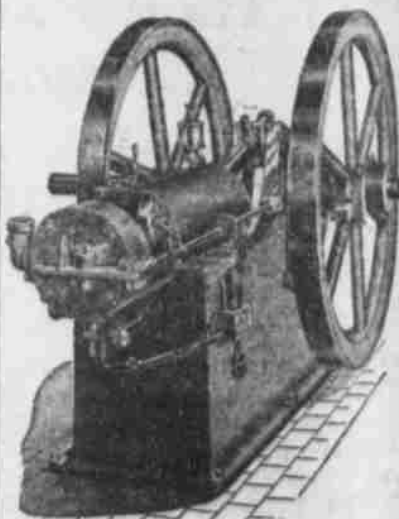
