TALK TAINTED MONEY

Missionary Workers Have Wheels About Filthy Lucre

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 13.—Delegates and visitors are pouring in on every train for the meeting which begins here tomorrow of the American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions. The special train bearing President Capen and the other officers and delegates from the East reached Seattle today.

Talks with the delegates already on the ground indicate a prevailing opinion that this is to be one of the most momentous meetings in the history of the board. The announced determination of Dr. Washington B. Gladden to introduce and push his resolution aimed at Rockefeller is a subject of much discussion among the delegates.

The resolutions aim to take from the executive officers of the American Board of missions the power to accept gifts of money. It is already evident that there is a wide difference of opinion among the leading members of the board.

Officers of the board consider the \$100,000 as closed, and, as the money has been appropriated for various uses in the mission field, they consider they are justified in saying so. It is believed they will endeavor to smother the Gladden resolution in committee when it comes before the meeting.

On the other hand strong pressure will be brought to bear by the ministers who fought the acceptance of the famous Rockefeller gift to have the resolution adopted. Some of the more conservative delegates, while opposed to the Gladden resolution as being aimed particularly at Rockefeller, are in favor of adopting measures to govern the board in the future in the collection of funds for missionary work.

FOOTBALL SEASON OPEN

The football season for Willamette is now on in dead earnest. Coach Bishop had 15 men out in uniform last evening, and the contest for positions was started. The men were fitted out with complete new uniforms, and presented a gay appearance with their striped, cardinal and old gold, sweaters and stockings.

The men are all in the finest physical condition and are standing in good shape the stiff practice that Coach Bishop has been putting them through for the past two nights. From this time on the team will indulge in two practices daily. The first will begin at 10 o'clock in the morning and the last at 3:30 in the afternoon. In addition to this the men will take a cross-country run and a bath every morning before breakfast. Manager Savage has instituted a training table at the Parsons boarding house, on the corner of Court and Cottage streets, where the players will be given plenty of real, substantial meals, but denied the undigestibles. No effort will be spared by either the management or the men to make the best possible showing at all times.

Coach Bishop has in mind a number of changes in his line-up, which he thinks will materially strengthen the team. Rader, who played such a speedy game at left tackle last season, was last night put through his paces at end. Hinkle had his old place at end last evening also, and Grannis and Jorsted were given a chance to see what they could do in that position. Nace, Long and Ford were all practiced at half, while Lounsbury and Philbrook alternated between guard and fullback. The position of quarterback, which has been occupying the attention of the supporters of the game in the city, because of the loss of Captain-elect Beach, was last night filled by Curtis, Coleman and Patton. Patton played end on the 'Varsity last year, while this is Coleman's first season in such fast company. He comes of a race of football players, however, and takes as naturally to it as a duck to water. He handled himself especially well last night, and will very likely give Patton a hard run for the position. He is also a good punter, and if he makes the team will be in a position to relieve Philbrook of a part of the kicking.

"Stonewall" Marker was in his old place at guard last night, and is the same consistent player that he proved himself to be all last year. Robbins and Kellar filled the tackle positions, while Fisher handed the ball back from center.

Pollard, James and Nelson, the three members of last year's first team, who were not out last night, will join the squad in a few days.

This is the first time in the history of Willamette University that the football management has succeeded in getting a full team out for practice two weeks before the opening of school. This was made necessary by the fact of the trip to California coming early in the season. The California teams have already been in training for several weeks.
