KENTUCKY MAY ADD DIAMONDS

To Her Other Products of Fast Horses and Fair Women

New York, Sept. 13.—David Draper, an expert diamond prospector, who has visited this country in the interest of an English syndicate, is in this city at present, investigating the situation of the American market in diamonds and other precious stones. He has just returned from a prospecting tour which took him through Kentucky and several other districts in the South. He made a careful inspection of the district between Ison and Creeches creeks, Elliott county, Ky., and says that surface borings showed that a stratum of Kimberlite is close to the surface. Kimberlite is the diamond bearing stratum which has yielded such enormous wealth of diamonds in South Africa. There are, in his opinion, also strong indications of garnets, flint, olivine, opals and mica. In his preliminary surface work he did not find any diamonds, but he is inclined to believe that there may be diamond bearing deposits in that district.

Mr. Draper does not consider it at all strange that no diamonds have, so far, been found in that district, as the surface is covered with a thick growth of vegetation. He points to the fact that many of the mines in the Transvaal were discovered only after twenty-five years of prospecting, although it was evident to mining experts that diamonds existed there. In his opinion there is no reason why the deposits in Kentucky should not bear just as large and fine gems as those in South Africa and says that the cost of mining would be a great deal cheaper in Kentucky than in South Africa. A yield of only five carats per load would be sufficient to make diamond mining in Kentucky paying.

Mr. Draper expects to meet the members of the syndicate in London about two weeks hence and will probably advise them to have expensive borings and investigations made by competent diamond prospectors. He thinks it would cost about \$100,000 to explore the district and that it would require about two years' time to complete the work.

Duchess to Visit Former Home.

London, Sept. 13.—The Duchess of Marlborough, accompanied by her elder son, the Marquis of Blandford, sailed today for New York. She will go directly to Brookholt, the estate of Mrs. Oliver H. F. Belmont, near Westbury, L. I., her mother having closed her Newport villa, Marble House. The Duchess expects to remain in America ten weeks, long enough to take in the New York horse show. It is almost two years since the former Consuelo Vanderbilt has been in America. She is the most popular of the three American-born duchesses. Mrs. Belmont, her mother, is now more closely identified with the Meadow Brook than with the Newport set and a great social season is expected at Westbury during the visit of the duchess.

First Statue of the Queen.

London, Sept. 13.—The commission for the first statue of Queen Alexandra to be erected in public, has just been given to Mr. George E. Wade, the distinguished English sculptor. The statue is intended for Hong Kong which has already given commissions for statues of King Edward and the Prince of Wales. The statue is to be erected out of a fund raised in connection with the celebration of the coronation in Hong Kong. The queen will be represented in her coronation robes. The statue will be of bronze and life size and the pedestal will be either granite or marble.

PRIMARY ELECTION LAW.

A BILL to Regulate General Elections in Oregon. (Corvallis Gazette.)

There is beginning to be much discussion of the good and bad points (if there be any of the latter) as relate to the primary election law which it is proposed shall have a trial at the general election for Oregon in June next. Already we see evidences of a desire on the part of certain manipulators to thwart the intent of the provisions of the bill.

Let us all stand for the law and give it a fair trial. It may prove satisfactory, weak if you please, but if such should be found the case it may be changed, modified, strengthened, or abolished entirely according to the lesson taught by trial. Only by giving it a fair test can such weaknesses, if any exist, be ascertained. Many people are in ignorance of the provisions of this bill and we are pleased to print a few of the more important sections that they may be enlightened, as follows:

Section 11. A political party within the meaning of this act is an affiliation of electors representing a political party or organization, which, at the next general election preceding polled for its candidate for representative in congress at least 25 per cent of the entire vote cast for that office in the state. Every such political party shall nominate its candidates for public offices, under the provisions of this law and not in any other manner, and it shall not be allowed to nominate any candidate in the manner provided by section 2791 of Bellinger and Cotton's annotated codes and statutes of Oregon. Every political party and its regularly nominated candidates, members and officers, shall have the sole and exclusive right to the use of the party name and the whole thereof, and no candidate for office shall be permitted to use any word of the name of any other political party or organization than that by which he is nominated. No independent or non-partisan candidate shall be permitted to use any word of the name of any existing political party or organization in his candidacy.

The names of candidates for public offices nominated under the provisions of this law shall be printed on the official ballots for the ensuing election as the only candidates of the respective political parties for such public offices like manner as the names of candidates nominated by other methods are required to be printed on such official ballots, and the provisions of

Section 2805 and 2806 of Bellinger and Cotton's annotated codes and statutes of Oregon shall apply to and are hereby made applicable to nominations for public office made under this law, so far as the same are not in conflict with the provisions of this law.

It will be noted that the law plainly says in the above section that nomination of all candidates for public office shall be made "under the provisions of this law and not in any other manner." And yet we find those who are endeavoring to all appearances, to ignore the intent of the law and hold what in every sense is the "same old convention."

Section 12. Before or at the time of beginning to circulate any petition for nomination to any office under this law, the person who is a candidate for such nomination shall send by registered mail or otherwise, to the secretary of state or the county clerk, or city clerk, recorder or auditor, as the case may be, a copy of his petition for nomination, signed by himself, and such copy shall be filed and shall be conclusive evidence for the purposes of this law that said elector has been a candidate for nomination by his party. All nominating petitions and notices pertaining to state or district offices to be voted for in more than one county and for judges of the circuit court and district attorneys, shall be filed in the office of secretary of state; for county offices and district offices to be voted for in one county only shall be filed with the county clerk; and for all city offices in the office of the city clerk, recorder or auditor, as the case may be.

Section 13. All petitions for nomination under this act for offices to be filled by the state at large, or by any district consisting of more than one county, and nomination petitions for judges of circuit courts and for district attorneys in districts consisting of a single county shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state not less than 20 days before the date of the primary nominating election, and for

other offices to be voted for in only one county or district or city, every such petition shall be filed with the county clerk or city clerk, recorder or auditor, as the case may be, not less than 15 days before the date of the primary nominating election.

The above are important sections, and make certain points very plain. It may be added that as soon as any petitions for nomination have been filed they become public property, and the books wherein they are recorded shall at all times be open to the public.
