EUGENE PEOPLE ACTIVE

Making Great Preparations for the Development Convention

The live business men of Eugene are very active in making preparations to entertain the third Willamette Valley Development Convention, and make it a success. They appreciate the fact that some of the brightest men in the state are coming there on Friday and Saturday of next week to discuss the most important interests of Oregon—irrigation, highways, harbors and railroads—and they are planning to have the greatest clambake ever given in Western Oregon—to feed 2000 visitors. The Daily Register of Tuesday says:

"Col. E. Hofer, the aggressive editor of the Salem Journal, president of the Willamette Valley Development League and general all-round live man, just now is the busiest man in Oregon. But the Colonel's activity has naught to do with politics. To Set Aside a Deed.

Hofer & Zorn, through their attorney, Mr. Bingham, today filed and argued before Judge Galloway a demurrer and motion in the suit of Eldridge vs. Hofer & Zorn and David M. Keene.

Hofer & Zorn hold a deed for some property in the northern end of the county, but Eldridge alleges that the deed they hold is merely a mortgage. The property was sold by Mrs. Eldridge while she was administrator of the estate of her husband, and the son alleges that she could only sell her dower interest. The property is valued at \$42,000, and Mr. Eldridge wishes to redeem it at \$14,000, the price paid for it by the defendants.

The argument on the motion and demurrer was taken under advisement until October 3d.
