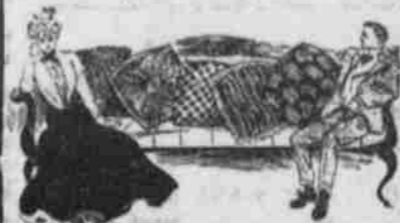

PROBABLY A MURDER

The Baker City Herald of Friday says: What may in the end prove to be a murder was committed in this city last evening about 9 o'clock when Dr. J. E. Burr, who had but recently arrived in town was sandbagged, and robbed of \$14.50, all the money that he possessed, and taken in a box car as far as Talocasset, where he was thrown off the train while it was in motion, sustaining injuries from which he will probably die.
Dr. Burr states that he was walking in the vicinity of the depot waiting for the train, preparatory to going to Portland. He had been drinking for some time and as a result was somewhat intoxicated. He had walked out of one of the saloons near the depot to get a breath of air, when suddenly as he passed an alley he was struck heavily over the head with some kind of a blunt instrument. He fell forward on his face and immediately lost consciousness. This is the last that he remembers until he came to and discovered himself lying bound and gagged on the floor of a box car. Three men were around him talking in low tones. When the train reached Talocasset, it slowed down, and then two of the men lifted him, having previously opened the side door of the box car, threw him out, bound and gagged as he was. He struck on his back and again became unconscious. This morning he was picked up by the crew of passenger train No. 1, and taken to the La Grande hospital where he became conscious this noon and told his story. He says that he is a graduate of Ann Arbor medical department of the class of 1886. After leaving college he fell by the wayside because of drink. In his clothes were found clippings from the Reno Evening Gazette showing where he had worked in the chain gang for drunkenness. The clipping tells the same story of Ann Arbor, and he also claims to be a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge. He says that he is 45 years old. When found his pocket was wrong side out and the only thing that he had on his person was a single switch key. His money was gone. The officers in this city had heard nothing of the hold-up. The man is not able to describe his assailants and the officers have no clue as to their identity.

Street Railway Men.
Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 25.—The Mechanical and Electrical Association and the Claim Agents' association began their annual convention in Philadelphia today preliminary to and in connection with the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the American Street Railway association. The association proper will begin its session Wednesday. The street railway association is composed of officers of street railway companies in all cities of the United States and Canada where street cars are in use.
Reports and papers to be presented to the convention show that the growth of street railway properties since the introduction of electrical traction has been phenomenal. In no other line of effort in a corresponding time can similar prodigious development be shown. The capitalization of street railway properties in the United States amounts

to \$1,761,571,812, an increase for the past year of \$68,181,514. Investments in New York street railways amounts to \$635,669,985. Nevada comes at the foot of the column in the amount of her street railway investments, she having only \$175,000 of bonds placed, with no capital stock. Pennsylvania comes next to New York with \$394,473,209, and Illinois third with \$284,699,150. Eighty per cent of all the street and elevated cars in the United States are in New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Illinois. When it comes to the matter of track mileage Ohio leads the list with 3437 miles, Pennsylvania second with 3319, New York third with 3192 and Massachusetts fourth with 2734. South Dakota is last with only four miles, and Nevada next with five miles. The total street car track mileage in the United States is 29,548 miles, and the number of companies 993.
